The 25% tariff "plus penalty" on imports of Indian goods in the United States, announced by President Donald Trump, should have come as no surprise to India. Mr. Trump has, for a while now, been voicing his displeasure at India's dealings with Russia, with regard to energy dealings and military equipment. He has also been quite vocal about India's high tariff and non-tariff barriers. These were the reasons he cited in his announcement on Wednesday. Add to this these facts — first, U.S. Trade Representative Jamieson Greer, as recently as Monday, had said that a trade deal with India needed "some more negotiations", and second, Indian Commerce Ministry officials had stopped talking about a mini-deal for a while now. Thus, the writing on the wall was pretty clear: a deal before August 1 was not in the offing. The only uncertainty in this mix was the mercurial Trump, but he has finally made his position clear. However, while there was an expectation that a mini-deal would not materialise, something does seem to have shifted in India-U.S. relations. This is showing up now in Mr. Trump's language — as a snide remark on Thursday about Pakistan selling oil to India in the future, or he, even more recently, calling the Indian economy "dead". Whether this was him venting his frustration at not being able to secure a deal with India — after calling himself the "Dealmaker in Chief" — or whether something else has triggered him is not clear yet. The fact is that both sides have not budged from their core policies.





The U.S. wants India to reduce its tariffs and provide market access across the board and India has held firm about ring-fencing agriculture and dairy.

All of this makes negotiating a potential bilateral trade agreement (BTA) that much more complicated. Where government officials have constantly changed deadlines for a mini-deal, they have been remarkably consistent about meeting the Fall deadline for the BTA. But now Mr. Trump has linked India's dealings with Russia to India's trade relations with the U.S. Who India does business with is a sovereign matter, and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry rightfully reiterated its commitment to securing India's national interest. On the other hand, the U.S. accounts for around a fifth of India's exports. The 25% tariffs plus a yet-unknown penalty places India at a relative disadvantage when compared to competitors such as South Korea, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines and Vietnam. Trade associations representing several sectors have already voiced their concern. Indian negotiators will have to work doubly hard to conclude an acceptable deal.



On the night of July 6, at Tetgama village in Purnia district of Bihar, five members of a family, three of them women, were mercilessly beaten and burnt alive. The alleged reason: witchcraft.

In today's India, branding a woman as a witch may seem like a throwback to a bygone era. However, news from States such as Jharkhand, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Bihar and Assam says otherwise: women are still harassed, ostracised, and killed in the name of witchcraft. The methods are often brutal.

The practice of hunting down and publicly lynching women accused of witchcraft is not just a freak occurrence; it is a systemic part of India's social landscape, driven not just by superstition but also gendered violence, deeply embedded in structures of patriarchy, caste, poverty, and fear. Over 2,500 women have been killed on charges of witchcraft since 2000, show National Crime Records Bureau figures.

The accusations of witchcraft are not made randomly. They fall heavily on women, especially those widowed, elderly, single or socially isolated. It's not out of any genuine belief in magical powers, but because they are obstacles to male inheritance, land ownership, or community conformity.

The allegation of witchcraft is put to effective use to repress and punish.

Labelling a woman as a "witch" maintains gender roles and punishes those who defy them. Outspoken or independent women are often scapegoated. The stigma surrounding such accusations is a life sentence for many and a death sentence for some. Witch-hunting is not a deviation, but an extension of gendered violence—like domestic abuse, rape, or dowry

Witchcraft accusations are common where poverty, illiteracy, and poor health facilities prevail.

In such contexts, supernatural explanations for illness or misfortune seem plausible.

Structural violence—state neglect, empty classrooms, abandoned health centres—amplifies the appeal of magical thinking.

This reflects Auguste Comte's "theological stage", where superstition dominates thought. It is no accident that witch-hunting thrives where the state fails to provide basic services. Even a simple fever becomes fertile ground for fear and vengeance.

Caste and patriarchy are intertwined dynamics in rural and tribal India. The accusations disproportionately target lower-caste and tribal women, often at the hands of dominant-caste members seeking to maintain hierarchies.





Land disputes and rivalries frequently take the form of witchcraft allegations masked as cultural practices.

Where tribal cosmologies once fostered reciprocity and healing, they are now distorted by pressures to modernise, migrate, and surrender land. Beliefs once sacred are now tools for landlords, village heads, or relatives to disempower women and stifle dissent.

Convictions in witchcraft cases are rare. Despite State-level laws, law enforcers often dismiss them as "local issues". The lack of implementation reflects administrative apathy and political failure.

India needs a comprehensive approach: legal enforcement, education, healthcare access, and community mobilisation. Empathy, education and awareness must be paired with structural reforms and intersectional policies that address caste, gender, and economic vulnerability. Witch-hunting is not an exotic **anomaly** but a brutal manifestation of patriarchy and state failure. We must amplify survivors' voices and campaign for a more humane society where no woman fears being branded a witch.



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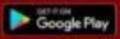
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
