From edging closer to signing a trade deal in early July, to the imposition of a 25 per cent penalty on August 6, on top of a 25 per cent tariff levied just a few days earlier, India-US trade relations have now moved into uncharted territory. While the additional tariffs will come into play in 21 days, opening up a possible window for negotiations — US trade negotiators are slated to arrive in Delhi on August 25 — the weaponisation of tariffs by US President Donald Trump to achieve what seem to be both trade and non-trade objectives, has placed India at a considerable disadvantage when compared to competitors such as Vietnam and Indonesia. In the face of this mounting pressure, India must stand firm, put its national interest first. Not surprisingly, Trump's action has evoked a strong response. Calling it "unfair, unjustified and unreasonable", the Narendra Modi government has said it will take "all actions necessary to protect its national interests". As it continues the trade talks with the Trump administration, it may be possible to offer more concessions in certain segments, there may be room for greater give and take. But, at the same time, Delhi should stay with its red lines in the face of mounting pressure in sectors such as agriculture and dairy — politically contentious areas, which are critical to the livelihoods of large sections of the Indian labour force. On Thursday, speaking at the MS Swaminathan Centenary International Conference in Delhi, Prime Minister Narendra Modi emphatically stated the government's position: "India will never compromise on the interests of its farmers, livestock rearers and fisherfolk".



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India's purchase of discounted Russian oil, which has ensured price stability in the global oil market, was a pragmatic move to secure its energy supplies. But with Trump raising the costs of continuing with this trade — as he attempts to curb the flow of money to Russian President Vladimir Putin, ostensibly to end the conflict in Ukraine — the same hard-headed realism must guide Delhi's approach now. Imports of Russian oil were at 1.6 million barrels per day in July, down 24 per cent from the month before, as per a report in this paper. The cost-benefit analysis of relying on one source of supply to such a large extent, however, must be seen only through the prism of India's interests — not dictated by Trump Goldman Sachs, an investment firm, has estimated that the higher tariff on India could bring down economic growth by around 0.6 percentage points. But who India should trade with, or for that matter, with whom it should build ties, must be part of a larger strategic plan that keeps BRICS — should it be expanded as planned — at the centre. US issues should, in any case, not be part of that trade calculus.

In light of the existential threat posed by climate change, the International Court of Justice (ICJ), also known as the World Court, delivered a landmark advisory opinion on states' obligations concerning climate change. Though not legally binding, such opinions are regarded as authoritative interpretations of international law and can influence state behaviour by generating international pressure.

States cannot ignore their duties. The Court unanimously ruled that states have legal obligations to protect the climate system and clarified the consequences for failing to meet them. Other international bodies, such as the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (ITLOS) and the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights (IACHR), have also recognised such responsibilities.

The opinion interprets climate treaties — including the <u>United Nations Framework Convention</u> on Climate Change, the Kyoto Protocol, and the Paris Agreement — in light of scientific consensus to strengthen their operation. The Paris Agreement's aim to limit temperature rise to "well below 2°C" and "pursue efforts" to limit it to <u>1.5°C</u> was reinforced, with the Court holding 1.5°C as the relevant threshold.

It rejected the claim that states have unfettered discretion in preparing their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), ruling that they must reflect the 'highest possible' ambition and be supported by measures reasonably capable of achieving them.



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The decision underscores the principle of common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities (CBDR-RC), meaning climate action standards depend on historical emissions, development level, and national circumstances. Developed nations have a binding duty to provide financial and technological support to developing countries for **mitigation** and adaptation, with breaches assessed on good faith and due diligence

Self-contained regime rejected - The Court dismissed the argument that climate treaties form a self-contained regime, affirming the applicability of general international and environmental law. Obligations include due diligence, preventing significant harm, cooperation, assistance, and environmental impact assessment, drawn from various treaties, customary law, and human rights principles. Withdrawal from treaties does not remove climate obligations, and human rights must be safeguarded during the green transition.

It also rejected the claim that states cannot be held individually responsible due to attribution difficulties, noting that scientific methods can determine each state's total contribution to emissions.

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


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Leverage for the Global South

Small island states, facing an existential threat from climate change, initiated the request for this advisory opinion — a significant legal victory that strengthens their ability to hold major emitters accountable. This decision is expected to bolster climate litigation, including the Ridhima Pandey case in India's Supreme Court.

Countries in the Global South can use this ruling to pressure developed nations to meet climate finance and technology transfer commitments, advancing both mitigation and adaptation efforts.
