Hidden Pattern: The examiner repeatedly changes names and facts but keeps the same offence structure.

Most Important Offences:

Repeated Areas:

Hidden Pattern: Examiner likes practical situations.

Most Repeated Concepts:

- Risk passes with ownership.

- Caveat emptor.

TIER 2 – HIGHLY IMPORTANT

6. General Clauses Act

Weightage Trend: HIGH

Repeated Areas:

- Double punishment

Hidden Pattern: Usually combined with practical question.

Future Attempt Prediction: 1. Repeal effect. 2. Computation of time practical question. 3. Power to appoint includes power to suspend/remove.

Preparation Priority: 8/10

7. Indian Stamp Act

Weightage Trend: MODERATE TO HIGH

Repeated Areas:

- Instruments
- Same transaction
- Multiple documents
- Stamp duty applicability

Future Attempt Prediction: 1. Whether documents form same transaction. 2. Consequences of unstamped instrument.

Preparation Priority: 7.5/10

8. Contract Act

Weightage Trend: HIGH

Repeated Areas:

- Consideration
- Free consent
- Misrepresentation
- Coercion
- Contingent contracts
- Quasi contracts

Hidden Pattern: Mostly practical problem based.

Future Attempt Prediction: 1. Free consent practical case. 2. Void vs voidable contract. 3. Quasi-contract problem.

Preparation Priority: 8.5/10

9. Limitation Act

Important Areas:

- Computation of limitation
- Condonation of delay

- Acknowledgement

Expected Weightage: 3–5 marks

HIDDEN EXAMINER PATTERNS

Pattern 1 – Theory + Practical Combination

Examiner first asks theory in one attempt and practical application in next attempt.

Example:

- Rule of Law theory → later constitutional application.
- Theft essentials → later practical scenario.

Meaning: Do not study only definitions.

Pattern 2 – Same Concept, Different Language

The same legal principle is repeated with:

- changed names
- changed facts
- different section wording

Students often miss this repetition.

Pattern 3 – Practical Questions Carry More Weight

Practical questions are increasing every attempt.

Priority order: 1. Practical problems 2. Section application 3. Case-law based conceptual questions 4. Pure theory

Pattern 4 – Small Chapters Are Used for Surprise Questions

Small chapters like:

- Stamp Act
- General Clauses Act
- Limitation Act

are often used for 4–5 mark surprise questions.

Do not skip them completely.
