### Exam Difficulty Level 1

#### Bank Clerk/PO Prelims, Office Assistant, and Cooperative Banks

Certain questions in exams like IBPS Clerk Prelims, SBI Clerk prelims, etc. follow the easy pattern of questions. Most of the questions asked in these kinds of exams are easy and can be attempted with the prior knowledge of basic grammar that aspirants might have studied in their school time.

- » Candidates must have a clear understanding of the basic rules of grammar. The concepts such as nouns, pronouns, verbs, tenses, etc. should be revised and the habit of reading newspapers or books should be developed.
- » The knowledge of such basic things also can help candidates tackle simple questions, detection of errors, fill in the blanks, sentence corrections, etc.

### Exam Difficulty Level 2

#### Bank Clerk/SO Mains, Officer Scale I, Insurance, Grade B exams & Grade A Preliminary exams

Compared to the level 1 questions, the difficulty level of questions in such exams is moderate and the application part of the concept is more prominent in this section. Some tips for level 2 difficulty questions are mentioned below.

- » Questions such as synonyms and antonyms may or may not be asked directly but could be a part of the Reading Comprehension question set. The candidates need to apply their knowledge of vocabulary in order to tackle such questions.

- » The application of vocabulary and grammar is also required in the Cloze Test questions as well.

## Exam Difficulty Level 3

### SBI PO Mains, IBPS PO Mains, LIC AAO, Grade A Officer, and Officer Scale 1 Mains Exam

- » One should be well versed in this section. Mostly, the questions on vocabs are asked in RC, a synonym or antonym of a certain word is asked. Apart from RC below are some topics where Vocab can help you to score good marks.
- » The best way to improve your vocabulary is to read newspapers, articles and write the words you find there in a notebook. Revise this notebook before starting studying for the day daily.
- » Another great way to learn the words is from the Mnemonic Techniques, these techniques help to remember important words of vocabulary. Doing so will help you to remember those words for a longer period of time.

## **Cloze Test**

- » From the Cloze Test, a good number of questions are observed now, in this section your grammatical and vocabulary-based skills are checked.
- » Questions are generally asked from vocab, preposition, and verbs, out of which the candidates have to choose the correct option.
- » Candidates are advised to practice mock tests to know the new pattern of Cloze test questions asked in banking exams nowadays.

## **Para Jumble**

- » Important topics under number series are completing the series, finding the missing term, and finding the wrong term in the series.

**Sol 1.**

It should be, will it be 'retaining' instead of 'retained'. Retain refers to save or store for future. Retained is the past tense of 'retain' and retaining is the continuous tense of retain. Since the context of the sentence questions about a future continuous scenario about India's image in terms of development, therefore, the word retaining would be used.

**Sol 2.**

Contravene is a verb which means to offend or conflict. Both sentences A and C are correct in the usage of the word. In sentence B, however, its meaning is not justified, therefore, the correct word in sentence B should be conclude.

**Sol 3.**

The correct option is option 5.  
No changes are required.

**Sol 4.**

The correct option is **option 3**.  
Iran's decision to reduce its commitments under the 2015 Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, which sought to curtail its nuclear capabilities, is more of a warning than a move to break the nuclear deal.

**Sol 5.**

The error lies in part 4 of the sentence as the word 'appropriate' which means 'suitable' has been incorrectly spelt here. Meaning of other words are given below:  
Implied=> said indirectly.  
Debate: a contention by words or arguments.  
Opponent: one that takes an opposite position (as in a debate, contest, or conflict).

**Sol 6.**

The correct answer is option 3, i.e., 'that burst from'.  
The phrase 'burst from' is incorrect and makes the sentence grammatically incorrect. It implies that Johnny Depp literally burst because of verve and energy, which does not make any sense.  
The correct phrase is 'burst with', which means to be overfull with something or some particular emotions.  
The correct sentence is:  
Johnny Depp is known for eccentric performances that burst with verve and energy.

**Sol 7.** The correct preposition that follows the word 'absolve' is 'from'. Thus option 3 is the correct answer.

**Sol 8.**


The error lies in part 1.  
The sentence uses the form 'Many a hardships', which is incorrect.  
Since we are referring to many of one thing, the noun must be in its singular form, viz, many a hardship.  
Parts 2 and 3 are grammatically correct and hence do not require any corrections. Their replacements are grammatically incorrect.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 1. The final sentence will be: *Many a hardship did he encounter, but with rare pluck, he persevered in his studies, and at the age of twenty odd years became a mandarin.*

**Sol 9.**

**Only sentences A and C are correct.**  
"Conflagration had finally died down" means "an extensive fire which destroys a great deal of land or property had finally reduced".  
**Hence the correct answer is option 1.**  
Sentence B is wrong as it doesn't convey the correct meaning of the phrase.

**Sol 10.**

The correct option is option 3.

 **Key-Points**

- The error is in 3rd part.
- The same verb can be used for two different subjects only when the subjects are in the same number.
- Here, the same verb 'are' is used for two different subjects- 'working hours', which is a plural subject, and 'salary', which is a singular subject.
- As the subjects differ in their number, the same verb can't be used for them.
- We need to use the correct form of the verb for the singular subject i.e. 'is'

The correct sentence will be '*His job is a torture- the working hours are too long, the salary is minimal, and his colleagues are very rude.*'

**Sol 11.** The correct word in this context would be 'listening' which is different from 'hearing' which is done without effort like a noise in the background which may or may not register, but listening takes an effort and we pay attention while doing it, hence 'listening to a song'. Thus the correct answer is that there is an error in part 4.

**Sol 12.**

The correct answer is option 4 i.e. D.

 **Explanation**

- When the statement is *positive*, we should use a *negative question tag* (and vice versa).
- In this sentence, the question tag would be negative as the statement is positive- '*haven't we?*' should be used in this case.
- An example is: *Yesterday was so much fun, wasn't it?*
- For example, *It's cold (positive), isn't it (negative)? And: It isn't cold (negative), is it (positive)?*

The correct sentence is: *We have been waiting at the station for an hour, haven't we?*

**Sol 13.**

The correct answer is option 3 i.e. C.

 **Explanation**

- In the above part C, the word 'begun' does not grammatically suit the sentence.
- When we use '*did not*' in a sentence, the verb following it must be in its base or original form.
- So, the verb '*begun*' should be replaced by '*begin*'.

Therefore, the correct sentence is: *The students were nervous as the exam did not begin on time.*

**Sol 14.**

The correct answer is **option 1 i.e. A**.

 **Explanation:**

- In part A, the word '*datas*' is the wrong form of the word. The word '*datd*' is already in its plural form. The

- grammatically correct singular form of 'data' is a datum.
- Some other words are also used in both plural and singular sense. They are, 'series,' 'deer,' 'sheep,' 'apparatus,' 'fish,' etc.
- An example is: *A series of seminars was delivered.*

Therefore, the correct statement is: *The present data show that the death rate has fallen down.*

**Sol 15.**

The correct alternative is option 3 i.e. C.

**?** Explanation

- One of the common errors in the use of certain conjunctions is made while using the conjunctions 'rather' and 'other.'
- These two conjunctions are followed *only by 'than'*.
- In the sentence above, 'rather' is followed by 'but' instead of 'than'. This is incorrect.
- The sentence is about someone who wanted to be an actor instead of a comedian. Hence, the appropriate conjunction pair to use is 'rather -than.'
- Therefore, option 1 is the correct answer based on this rule.
- An example of the same is: *I would rather leave than take part in a dishonest deal.*

Therefore the correct statement would be: *He wanted to be an actor rather than a comedian.*

**Sol 16.**

The correct answer is option 1, i.e., 'The bully was always'. The given sentence is clearly not in the past tense and thus the use of the word 'was' is incorrect. The given sentence expresses the future actions/behaviour of a bully. Thus, the correct word to use instead of 'was' is 'will', which expresses a strong intention/assertion about the future.

The correct sentence is:  
The bully will always sport a mean expression whenever he is terrorizing the younger kids.

**Sol 17.**

The correct option is **option 1**.

It should not be 'who' in part A.

Instead of that, it should be '**which**' because here we are talking about a political party and not a person.

**Sol 18.**

The correct option is **option 4**.

It should not be 'since' in part A because it is not talking about some time.

It should not be 'views' in part B because the sentence is in the present tense.

**Sol 19.**

The correct answer is option 3, i. e., C.  
The error lies in part C.  
"Under the pretext" is a correct phrase used to indicate a false reason which one uses to do something else. The use of "over" in the sentence is grammatically incorrect.

Correct sentence:  
He went to watch a movie with his friends under the pretext of going to tuition.

**Sol 20.**

The error lies in parts 1 and 3.  
Part 1 uses the form 'He betaken himself, which is incorrect. Since the sentence uses the simple past tense verb 'prayed', the correct verb form here must be the simple past tense form 'betook'.  
To Betake- To go to.  
Part 3 uses the adjective form 'hard', which is incorrect as it is referring to the verb, 'dealt' and not to any noun. So, it must be in

its adverb form 'harshly'.  
Part 2 is grammatically correct and hence does not require any corrections.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3. The corrected sentence will be: *While there, he betook himself to the temple of the deity who had dealt so harshly with him and prayed for a revelation.*

**Sol 21.**

The correct answer is option 2.  
The simple present form of the verb 'ascribe' must be replaced with the past participle form of the verb i.e. 'ascribed' as the verb phrase 'must be' precedes it.  
The other parts are grammatically correct.

**Sol 22.**

Correct option - 4  
1, 2 & 3. Here, concept of double negatives is brought under consideration. Verb 'forbade' is a past tense of 'forbids' which means to command someone not to do something. Since, it is itself a negative word. So, using not will make the sentence positive in meaning which is grammatically incorrect. Thus, options 1, 2 & 3 are eliminated.  
5. Also, 'forbade' is a past tense of verb 'forbid'. And, past tense does not take s/es after it. Hence, option 5 is eliminated.  
Thus, option 4 is the correct answer.

**Sol 23.**

Correct option - 5  
1. First of all, word many is a noun which is used for a large number of people, places or things., that means it's a plural noun. Hence, according to sub-verb agreement, verb should also be plural. But, verbs used in option 1, 'draws' and 'wakes' are singular. Hence, option 1 is eliminated.  
2 & 4. We refer to morning, afternoon and evening as 'in the morning', 'in the afternoon', 'in the evening' but not 'in the night' instead we say 'at night'. 'In night' shows a period of time, whereas, with reference to the context, there is a particular time to go to bed. Hence, options 2 & 4 are eliminated.  
3. There is a specific preposition 'to' is used when it is used in the context of going to bed to sleep, i.e. 'go to bed'. 'In bed' is used when the person is already lying on the bed. Hence, option 3 is eliminated.  
So, option 5 is the correct answer.

**Sol 24.**

The correct answer is option 3-C  
When two actions happen in the past, we assign the simple past tense to the action happening later and the past perfect tense to the action happening earlier. From the given sentence, it is clear that the action of lying or not lying had taken place earlier than that of her 'rejecting the suggestion'.  
Thus, 'has' needs to be replaced with 'had'.

**Sol 25.**

The error lies in part B.  
The sentence uses the preposition 'from', which is incorrect, given the context. The betterment will be 'of' the youth and not 'from' it. So, the correct preposition here is 'of'.  
So, the errorless combination is ACD.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.  
Correct sentence - Formulation of schemes for betterment of the youth is one of the prime objectives of the mayor.

**Sol 26.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is 3.  
The option 1 is incorrect, as the correct past perfect tense form would be 'had run away' and not the past tense 'had ran away'.  
The adjective 'considerable' is incorrect here, as it is used right after a verb, which suggests that it must be an adverb. The adverb form is 'considerably'. This means options 2 and 4 are incorrect.  
A fervour is a noun meaning an intense, passionate feeling. The context of the sentence suggests that the adjective form 'fervent' and the adverb form 'fervently' are incorrect, as it is used with the preposition 'with'. So, it must be a noun. This makes options 4 and 5 incorrect.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 27.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is 2.

The preposition 'from' means coming or arising out of something, which is incorrect here. The correct preposition would be 'of'. The heat of the moment means doing things spontaneously, while being angry or excited. So, 1 is incorrect.

Option 3 is incorrect, as 'whom' is the object of the verb in passive voice. It cannot be used as the correct conjunction here. Option 4 uses the to-infinitive, so the verb must be in its simple present tense form. But, the verb used here is 'confronted', so it is incorrect.

News is among those nouns which are plural in form but singular in meaning. So we must use a singular verb 'has'.

**Sol 101.**

In the given sentence only two parties were involved in the clash: cops and the protesters. Therefore, between should be used instead of amongst.

Thus, option 3 is the correct answer as the error is in the third part.

**Sol 102.**

The correct answer is option 4.

There is an error in the part of the speech of the word 'approximate' in the fourth part of the sentence.

Since it is modifying the adjective 'thirty', the adverb 'approximately' needs to be used to give proper meaning to the sentence.

**Sol 103.**

The correct answer is option 1-A

The sentence uses the phrase 'over the next few weeks', suggesting that the action shown by the main verb has been done frequently. Since we cannot attach any time frame to the action, we have to use an indefinite tense. Past indefinite tense will be the correct fit here as using present indefinite(emphasizes) makes the sentence grammatically wrong and contextually meaningless. Thus we have to replace the word 'emphasise' with the simple past tense verb 'emphasized'

The president emphasised the same points in his speeches over the next weeks.

**Sol 104.**

Option 3 is the correct answer.

The incorrect word used is 'sequence'.

The correct form of the word to be used is 'sequences'.

The sentence is stated in the present and plural tense.

Thus, the latter part of the sentence is about the 'letters and number sequences' and so the plural form of the word should be used.

The correct sentence will be:

*Alphabet and number songs help children remember letters and number sequences.*

**Sol 105.**

(2) has an error.

'futures declines' is incorrect

The **correct** word should be 'decline' as 'futures' is plural.

**Sol 106.**

(4) has an error.

The phrase 'plumb overnight' is qualifying the noun 'a one-week low of 113.395' and functioning as an adjective.

A phrase starting with a participle ('plumbed') can function as an adjective.

**Sol 107.**

(3) has an error.

'on Thursday, 'complicates' is grammatically incorrect.

Here, 'complicate' cannot function as a verb but as a participle (complicating).

**Sol 108.**

(3) has an error.

'affect local markets,'

The phrase 'affect local markets,' is qualifying the noun 'factors' and is functioning as an adjective.

A participial phrase, starting with a participle ('affecting' or 'affected'), functions as an adjective.

Consider changing the word 'affect' to 'affecting'.

**Sol 109.**

Correct option - 1

When cardinal number (one, two, three, etc.) are used with days, weeks, months, years (which are nouns) and then followed again with a noun, then, such nouns (days, years, etc.) act as an adjective. Five should be followed by a plural noun years. But, an adjective should be used which is not singular or plural. Hence, replace years with year. So, option 1 is the correct answer. Correct sentence - The Congress of China has confirmed the second five-year tenure for Mr. Xi and regarded him as the most powerful leader of China heading the party, the Presidency and the military.

**Sol 110.**

Answer: 2

The city of Chennai is in crisis *after* the four reservoirs ran dry.

Eliminate options 1 and 3.

Option 4 has the plural form, 'crises' but there is only one crisis mentioned in the sentence. Eliminate option 4.

Option 5 has a modifier error. 'ran completely dry' is the correct usage and not 'ran dry completely.' Eliminate option 5. Hence, option 2 is the answer.

**Sol 111.**

The correct answer is option 2, i. e., B.

The error lies in part B.

"Would" is followed by the verb in its simple present tense form.

Here, it is followed by simple past tense "cherished".

Correct sentence:

*I would always cherish the memories of our trip to Gangtok.*

**Sol 112.** Option 2 can't be correct because, Presidency is "the period or tenure of a president." Here we are not talking about someone's presidency. In option 3 **candidature** is wrong. It is the status of being a candidate. Here this word is not suitable. Here we should just use "candidate." In options 4 and 5 the use of prepositions "to and in" is wrong. Actually what we should write is "by a margin of." By is used for "**indicating the amount or size of a margin.**" So talking all this into consideration, option 1 is correct.

**Sol 113.** The most common mistake here is with a phrase with 'water.' The correct phrase is "**watershed.**" It means "an event or period marking a turning point in a situation." So option 1 is correct. Also, electoral is an adjective. We can't perform an action (boycott) on an adjective. We must use a noun. So option 1 is correct.

**Sol 114.** The most noticeable mistakes are: first of all a rocket can't launch itself as the first sentence suggests, so "**it will be**



launched" by scientists. Secondly, we can't use "in" with dates, like in sentence 5. It must be "on." Also since there are two "satellites" which is plural, option 4 is incorrect. So overall, only option 3 is correct.

**Sol 115.**

The correct answer is option 2 i.e. only B.

 **Key-Points**

- The error lies in part B of the sentence.
- In part B of the sentence, 'the Supreme Court had score a goal' is grammatically wrong because the sentence is given in the present tense and the action, in the sentence, is anticipated or expected to be completed in Future tense, Hence:

- the Supreme Court had scored a goal 
- the Supreme Court will score a goal 
- So, instead of 'had' the correct word would be 'will'.

- The simple future tense indicates that an action is in the future relative to the speaker or writer. There are no inflected forms for the future in English (nothing like those -ed or -s endings in the other tenses).
- The formula for the future simple is will + V(Base form).
- Positive Sentence: S + will + V(Base form) + object...
  - Example: *I will go to Thailand.*
- Negative Sentence: S + will not/won't + V(Base form) + object...
  - Example: *I will not go to Thailand.*
- Question form: Will + S + V(Base form) + ...?
  - Example: *Will you go to Thailand?*

 **Hint**

- You can make the simple future tense by adding a "be verb" like 'is', 'are', or 'am' and "going to" before the base form of a verb.
- Tip: Make sure to use the right be a verb. There are only three: am, are, is. Be verbs should match their subject!

The correct sentence is:

Many immigrants have forgotten their native cultures because of acculturation in their new countries.

The correct answer is option 2, i.e., 'prove it shall be granted'. The given sentence is in the past tense. The word 'shall' expresses the future tense, making the sentence grammatically incorrect.

To correct the sentence, the word 'shall' should be replaced with 'should', which is the past tense of 'shall'.

The company was hard-pressed to prove it should be granted the contract since it didn't have any other clients on the hook.

The error is in the 3rd part of the sentence.

The correct word to be used here is the noun "legislation: the process of making or enacting laws" and not the verb "legislate: make or enact laws."

Phrases (I) and (III) cannot be used to join the two sentences. Phrase (II) is the most suitable and the sentences can be combined as follows:

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

Both ii and iii are incapable of joining the two sentences without changing the meaning of the initial sentences. The word 'because' is used to indicate 'for the reason that'. It does not fit the context.

Thus, 'not only' has to be placed before the noun 'Mount Everest' like 'but also' before 'Kanchenjunga'. Thus the error is in the first part of the sentence.

It can be said that both the words-leading and rising are inappropriate. Hence, C and D should be interchanged.  
**The correct sentence:**  
(A) Tensions over land and natural (B) resources have been (C) rising for some time, sometimes (D) leading to (E) murderous violence.

**Sol 294.**

There are two events in this sentence. The finding of the note in the kitchen and Sarah and Tammy going or shopping. Important thing to note here is that 'they went for shopping first and then the note was found. In such cases, we must use 'had' with the first event. So part C is wrong, because she and Tammy had gone should be the correct formation. Also, we already know that "she" in part C is referring to 'Sarah.' Because there is no one else involved here. So Sarah had gone shopping with Tammy. So it doesn't make sense to say 'a note to Sarah.' It should be 'note from Sarah.'  
**Correct Sentence:**  
No one was in the kitchen, but a note *from* Sarah explained that she and Tammy *had gone* to town for shopping again.

**Sol 295.**

The correct answer is option 3), i.e. A-D.  
We can go through the sentence in the following way:  
We think of (A) \_\_\_\_\_ as the time of (B) \_\_\_\_\_ and (C) \_\_\_\_\_ new green (D) \_\_\_\_\_, but it is often the most (E) \_\_\_\_\_ time of year in western Europe.  
Blossom means flower; produce flowers or masses of flowers.  
Clearly, B is meaningful. C and E have contextually correct words.  
Growth which means increase is inappropriately used here. Hence, A and D should be interchanged.  
**The correct sentence:**  
We think of (A) spring as the time of (B) blossom and (C) fresh new green (D) growth, but it is often the most (E) polluted time of year in western Europe.

**Sol 296.**

The correct answer is option 4 i.e. D-C and B-A.



**Explanation:**

We can look at the sentence in the following way:  
My \_\_\_\_\_ (A) and I \_\_\_\_\_ (B) to go on a trekking and \_\_\_\_\_ (C) climbing \_\_\_\_\_ (D) in Northern India.

- Decided: The past tense of 'decide' which means to come to a resolution about something. This is a verb (an action) that cannot be owned by anyone, so it cannot be preceded by the determiner 'my'.
- College: An educational institution specializing in higher education after school. A noun like 'college' cannot be preceded by 'I'. A verb should follow 'I'.
- Trip: A journey taken on for pleasure. 'Trekking' is an action that is a part of a 'trip' it cannot be done with a 'trip'. "Trip climbing" is grammatically and contextually incorrect.
- Mountain: A large elevation of the Earth's surface rising abruptly from the surroundings. If one refers to the action of climbing a mountain, it has to be one specific mountain and needs to be preceded by 'a'.

Hence, we need to interchange D-C and B-A in order to make the sentence contextually correct.

So the Correct Sentence is:  
*My friends and I decided to on a trekking and mountain climbing trip in Northern India.*

**Sol 297.**

The correct answer is option 3), i.e. B-E.  
We can go through the sentence in the following way:  
Another (A) \_\_\_\_\_ is that (B) \_\_\_\_\_ are the (C) \_\_\_\_\_ of a vegetative state - (D) \_\_\_\_\_ and (E) \_\_\_\_\_ to what is around them.

Uncommunicative means shy / unwilling to talk or impart information. So, D is contextually correct.

Misconception means incorrect view or opinion.

Definition means explanation or meaning.

Clearly, A and C have meaningful and contextually correct words.

Insensitive means heartless / showing or feeling no concern for others' feelings.

It is clear that both the words i.e. Insensitive and plants are contextually incorrect. Hence, B and E should be interchanged.

The correct sentence:

Another (A) misconception is that (B) plants are the (C) definition of a vegetative state – (D) uncommunicative and (E) insensitive to what is around them.

**Sol 298.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is 5.

'Towards' is incorrect, given the context of the sentence, as it means 'in the direction of something'. The correct preposition must be 'to'.

To be 'of' value is something that is precious or appreciated. So, the correct preposition must be 'of' and not 'to', 'from', 'above' or 'in'.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 299.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is option 5.

The sentence refers to one thing that was important, so the corresponding verb must be the singular past tense verb 'was' and not the plural 'were'.

The adverb 'essentially' is incorrect here, as it cannot make the sentence meaningful. The correct form here must be the adjective form 'essential'.

The verb 'ought to' means a responsibility or obligation of doing something. It can be used in place of 'must', but the sentence does not use the preposition 'to' after it, which is incorrect.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 300.**

The error is in part (1) of the sentence.

As a rule, whenever you refer to yourself and some other person, you put the other person's name first.

Therefore, it should be 'John and I are going to the circus..'

**Sol 301.**

The sentences are joined by the conjunction 'and'. This means that they are related and must also use the same tense. The first sentence uses the past tense verb 'tied', indicating the second sentence must also be in past tense. In the second sentence, the main verb 'began' is incorrect, as it shows the past participle form of the verb. The correct word here will be 'began running'. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 302.**

Option 3.

The error is in part 3 of the sentence.

'No seen' is grammatically incorrect.

It should be 'not seen'.

**Sol 303.**

A reference to the performance of India's economic growth in the three months ending in September is made.

Note, the highlighted text refers to a point of time in the past, so, the tense of the sentence is Simple Past.

The form of the verb used for a simple past tense is verb-2<sup>nd</sup> form.

The correct phrase is likely *picked up*.

**Sol 304.**

(3) has an error.

The form of the participle, encountering, used in (3) is incorrect.

The correct form of the participle to be used is Past participle (encountered), not present participle.

The reason is that India is not currently encountering disruptions but *encountered* it in the past.

The correct phrase is *encountered* after India's shock ban.

**Sol 305.**

(2) has an error.

The tense of the given sentence is in the Present tense as recommended by the use of 'have' and a present participle '*benefiting*'.

The use of 'have' makes the exact tense of the sentence being Present Perfect.

The correct form of the verb to be used in present perfect tense is verb-3<sup>rd</sup> form, so, *adjusted*, instead of *adjust*, would be used.

The correct phrase is '*largely adjusted to the changes*'.

**Sol 306.** The error is in the **fourth option as** the word '**legitimize**' means **to legalize** and it does not go with the context of the sentence. Instead, the word '**control**' can be used.

**Sol 307.**

The correct answer is option 4-D

'There' is an adverb which means 'at a certain place or position', which is incorrect given the context of the sentence. The correct form to be used here becomes the determiner 'their', meaning '*belonging to a group of people*'.

So, the error is in part 4. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 308.**

The sentence is of the form:

Pronoun + verb + subject

The sentence is of simple past tense. The verbs used in the sentence should be base verbs then i.e **challenge**. Therefore, sentences 2,3 and 5 are eliminated since they use incorrect verbs. The sentence 4 is eliminated because it uses the **wrong name of the object**. It should be Mount Everest instead of "Mounts Everest".

Hence, the correct option is option 1.

Correct sentence: Following the report on environmental issues, the committee had decided to take serious steps for pollution control and accordingly incorporated environment-friendly packages as an integral part of the upcoming project.

Following is used here as a preposition which we are use in starting, after the report action is shown by the steps taken by the committee for pollution control and third part after end accordingly as a adverb follows the incorporation of environment-friendly packages for upcoming project. Hence the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 311.**

The correct answer is option 4.



**Key-Points**

- The fourth part is missing an article before the word 'world'.
- It is a specific noun as it refers to the particular world we inhabit and the article 'the' should precede it.
- Thus the correct sentence is -
  - '*In the aspects of naval warfare, the US navy is undoubtedly the largest and most powerful navy in the world.*'



**Additional Information**

- No article is generally used with abstract nouns. They are uncountable nouns hence A/An cannot be used.
- If nouns are followed by 'of' an article precedes the noun. Article + Noun + of + .....

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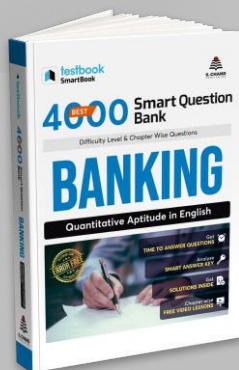
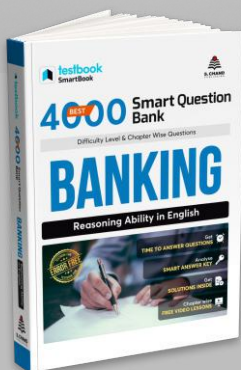

- 'The' is often used before a superlative degree.
- 'Undoubtedly' in the second the part which is qualifying the adjective 'largest' and 'most powerful'.

**Sol 312.**

Correct option - 3

"A quarter" shows it is a collective noun. And, collective noun takes singular verb. Thus, option 3 is the correct answer.

Correct sentence - According to the National Crime Records Bureau, only about a quarter of rape cases ends in conviction.

**Sol 313.**

The correct answer is 'I' i.e. error lies in part 1 of the sentence.

### Key-Points

- The sentence uses the contraction it's, which is incorrect.
- The correct word here should be the determiner its.
  - IT'S = IT + IS/HAS (contraction)
  - ITS = determiner (belonging to the object in question)

So the correct sentence is- *Morgan Stanley lowered its long-term Brent price forecast on Tuesday and said that the oil market is broadly balanced in the first quarter of 2019.*

**Sol 314.**

The correct answer is Only III.

### Key-Points

- The error is in Part III of the sentence. 'despite of' should be replaced by 'despite'. Part III is the correct replacement for the part given in the question.
- There is a difference between 'in spite' and 'despite' although they are used in similar contexts.
- While we must use 'of' with 'in spite' as 'in spite of' we don't have to do that with 'despite.'
- Despite is used alone to mean 'even though; without being affected by the thing mentioned.'
- So we must remove 'of' after 'despite' from the sentence.
- Correct sentence: *Swapna Barman on Wednesday created history by becoming the first Indian heptathlete to win an Asian Games gold here, a feat she achieved despite a toothache.*
- Hence, the correct answer is option 3.

### Confusion Points

I, II, and III are phrases that can replace the first, the second, and the third part of the sentence respectively. These are replacements for the parts present in the original sentence.

**Sol 315.**

The error lies in 1 as the word 'further' means 'more' and it makes no sense here.

The correct word here is the preposition 'beyond' which means that stories take us far away from reality.

The correct sentence is:-

*Stories are all about going **beyond reality** and it is no wonder that they let you understand big concepts with only a little bit of reading practice.*

Hence the correct answer is option 1.

**Sol 316.**

The correct answer is 'Only I'.

### Key-Points

- The error is in Part I of the sentence.
- We must use the 'Past Participle' form of a verb with 'has/have/had.' 'Lend' is in Present tense. Its past

participle form is 'lent.'

- Thus, lend will be replaced with lent

Correct sentence: The government has *lent* millions of pounds to debt-ridden banks in contravention of local banking laws.

**Sol 317.**

The error lies in parts 2 and 3.

The phrase 'strike a chord' means *to cause people to agree with something*. The phrase goes as: *to strike a chord ~~to~~ /with people*. Part 3 uses the simple present tense form of the verb 'lead', which is incorrect here. Given the context, the correct verb form here should be the third form: led.

Part 1 is grammatically correct and hence does not require any corrections.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 318.**

The correct answer is will have finished.

### Key-Points

- The sentence is in future perfect tense. This can be understood by the words 'by this time next week'.
- Therefore, the future perfect form of the verb 'will have finished' has to be used.
- The future perfect tense rule:
  - S + will + have + past participle + ...
  - Example: I will have finished my report by the end of this month.

**Sol 319.**

The correct answer is Going.

### Key-Points

*Going is the correct gerund form of the base verb 'go'.*

### Important Point

1. When 'like' or 'hate' is followed by a gerund, it refers to the action of liking or disliking in general.  
For eg. I like going to school
2. When 'like' or 'hate' is followed by a to-infinitive(to+base verb), it refers to the action of liking or disliking something as a habitual event.  
For eg. I like to go to school.
3. A gerund is a verb form ending in 'ing' which functions as a noun.  
For eg. Swimming is a good exercise.

**Sol 320.** Here, 'took' is in past tense. When there isn't a logical time shift, all the verbs in the sentence must be written in the same tense. Hence, here the verb being 'to stack' must be written in past tense, that is, 'stacked'.

**Sol 321.** 'Explain' is already used and cannot be repeated as 'explain and explain' is incorrect. Also, 'be calling them' gives a clear meaning, but if 'be' is used, 'called' is incorrect. Hence, the correct option is 'have to call them'.

**Sol 322.** The dream is being described here, so 'he was to swim' is irrelevant as this was already occurring in the dream which was happening in the past. Hence, 'swimming' as the continuous form is the correct choice. Note that the blank is already preceded by was implying that the sentence is in the past tense. Thus, option 2 would be incorrect.

**Sol 323.**

The error lies in part 3.

The sentence uses the form 'could not be cutting', which is incorrect. As it is used with the verb 'be', the correct form should be 'could not be cut'.

Parts 1 and 2 are grammatically correct and hence do not require any corrections.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 324.**

The error here is in Part A of the sentence. The sentence is referring to an imaginary (we know this because of the use of "if") situation in which the person, about whom the speaker is talking about, is a Prime Minister. In such situation we use "were" irrespective of the subject being singular or plural. If it is an imaginary situation, we must use "were." So option 1 is correct.

**Sol 325.** The error is in option 1 as word here should be 'accepted'; 'expect' is used when you are waiting for something, and 'accept' is used when you agree to something

**Sol 326.**


It can be understood from the sentence that the terrorists, extremists and the smugglers have united to destroy the country. Thus the word 'collide' is incorrect here. The word 'collude' has been misplaced with 'collide'. The word 'collude' means to conspire against someone. Thus, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 327.**

'Means' when used as a noun means either 'income' or 'method'. In either case, the verb 'know' is rarely used with the word. The correct word in the context should have been 'meaning' which means 'definition'.

**Sol 328.**

The correct option is option 3

 **Key-Points**

- The error is in 3rd part.
- The same verb can be used for two different subjects only when the subjects are in the same number.
- Here, the same verb 'were' is used for two different subjects- 'window panes', which is a plural subject, and 'furniture', which is a singular subject.
- As the subjects differ in their number, the same verb can't be used for them.
- We need to use the correct form of the verb for the singular subject i.e. **was**.

**The correct sentence will be** 'The kitchen was in a complete mess- the window panes were broken, the furniture was toppled, and the cutlery was in pieces.' 

**Sol 329.**

- The correct answer is Option 1.
- In part A, the error lies in the wrong usage of the article 'an'. The article 'an' is used only before the vowel sounding words. The word 'United' gives the consonant sound so the article 'a' should be used.
- Therefore, the correct sentence is 'A united Opposition in the Lok Sabha on Monday attacked the Narendra Modi government over the detention of National Conference (NC) leader and Lok Sabha member Farooq Abdullah, calling it "illegal" and demanded his immediate release so that he could attend the winter session.'

**Sol 330.**

Correct sentence: *Long ago the scheme of installing solar panels had been approved by the technological department, but due to obdurate higher management the same could not be implemented in the office premises.*

**Sol 331.**

Correct sentence: *Sudeshna's deep insight into the share market and her strategic deals with the business partners along with her unique business skills made her win the most promising entrepreneur of the year.*  
Hence, option 2 is correct.

**Sol 332.**

Correct sentence: My hands are already engaged and Neelam has gone to the market; so at present there is none to help you in

the kitchen.  
Hence the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 333.**

The correct option is **option 2**.

It should not be 'slow down' in part B.

Instead of that, it should be '**further**' because it wants to increase its growth.

**Sol 334.**

The correct answer is option 2.  
The error lies in part I and part II of the sentence.  
In part I, the word 'contrived' has been used incorrectly. The sentence is in the present tense, but the word 'contrived' is in the past tense. Therefore, it should be replaced with 'contrive' to make the sentence grammatically correct.  
In part II, the phrase 'beyond that the' is grammatically incorrect. Therefore, it should be replaced with 'beyond which the' as mentioned in option II to make it more meaningful.  
Thus, the correct answer is option 2, i.e., Both I and II.  
The correct sentence is:  
No matter how skillfully we contrive our schemes, there is a point beyond which the one principle cannot be promoted without some sacrifice of the other.

**Sol 335.**

In the given sentences, the correct grammatical form should be 'will have' or 'would have'.  
This is only shown by option 3.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 336.**

The correct answer is option 3) i.e. c.



Explanation-

- In the part, 'c' of the given sentence verb 'raise' has been used which is wrong.
- In the given sentence, the subject for which the verb 'raise' has been used is 'summit' which is singular, so, a singular verb i.e. 'raises' will be used here.

Hence, the correct sentence will be: As China and India are civilisational states, neighbours and members of the future global triumvirate, the Narendra Modi-Xi Jinping summit in Mamallapuram raises the question — do we understand China, as well as we, claim to understand the U.S.?

**Sol 337.** The word here should be 'palate' meaning the roof of your mouth, or the top of your mouth from inside, 'palette' is the flat board that the artists use to mix colours while painting. So the error is in option 4

**Sol 338.**

The sentence that expresses the meaning most appropriately is sentence (1), 'Even if he was a good cook, he wasn't invited to the backyard barbecue party his neighbours were having because his manner was bossy and intimidating.'  
None of the other options are applicable, because they are either not connected in proper causal order, or are grammatically or syntactically wrong.

**Sol 339.**

Correct option - 3  
Firstly, when relative pronoun is used in the sentence, then verb is used according to number of the subject used just before the relative pronoun. Here, relative pronoun is which. The subject used just before it "testing programme", it is a singular noun. Hence, verb should also be singular. Thus, replace have with has. Now, deepen is a main verb, hence its past participle (V3) is deepened. So, replace deepen with deepened. Thus, the correct form is "has deepened". So, option 3 is the correct answer.

**Sol 340.**

Correct option - 3

Firstly, word "major" is an adjective, so in order to use it, it should be placed with either noun/pronoun or verb. But, it is directly followed by a preposition. And, preposition is used to define a noun/pronoun. Thus, replace major with noun majority.

Hence, option 3 is the correct answer.

Correct sentence:

Without any sort of government safety net, a *majority* of India's population has no cover for old age or unforeseen contingencies.

**Sol 341.**

When you mean it is or it has, use an apostrophe. When you are using it as a possessive, don't use the apostrophe. So 'its' will be used here.

We typically use it when talking about an upright target: He threw the book at the dog. The judge threw the book at her.

If the target is flat, we typically say on instead:

I spilled it on the floor. I dropped my things on the table after school.

Hence, 'on' will be used here. Thus option 3 is the correct answer.

Correct sentence:  
The BJP, which emerged as the single largest party in the elections, has been given 15 days to prove *its majority on the floor of the House*.

**Sol 342.**

The correct answer is option (5).

**Key-Points**

- Hence we find that the error lies in Part 1 of the sentence.

The correct sentence will be: Ours is the only culture that can boast of unique adaptability.

**Sol 346.**

The correct answer is option 4

The conjunction 'because' needs to be replaced by the conjunction 'and'.

The error is in option 4 as many adjectives are put one after another and the conjunction 'and' not 'because' is needed to connect all of them as they are all similar in nature.

The correct answer is: It will also make banking services convenient, safe reliable and transparent.

**Sol 347.** The error is in option 2 as 'addition' means to add something ; but the word needed here is 'edition' meaning published version of a book.

**Sol 348.**

Both B and C are correct.

Ignoble means "not honourable in character or purpose".

Hence the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 349.**

Here, it is important to know the meaning of words in order to understand the context in which they should be used.

*Rumblings* mean the continuous sound of complaints.

*Rigging* means something done illegally to bring out results.

*Perdure* means something that continues for some time.

Correct sentence:

*The (A) rumblings in the Opposition about (B) vote-rigging by the ruling party may (C) perdure for some time.*

Hence, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 350.**

The correct answer is option 2.

The word 'perpetrate' means 'to carry out or commit'.

In sentence A, the word has been used incorrectly. The nations cannot 'commit' the memory of themselves. The sentence does not make any sense.

In sentence B, the word has been used correctly. The sentence suggests that 'he vowed revenge for the crime committed on his family'.

In sentence C, the word has been used incorrectly. The later generations cannot 'commit' the cult. The sentence does not make any sense.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 351.**

Words A and E, and C and D have been interchanged.

(A) :- here 'reconcile' is the correct word. The meaning of 'reconcile' is 'make someone accept (a disagreeable or unwelcome thing)'. The BJP candidate for CM cannot digest the fact that the party lost the elections, therefore 'reconcile' here is the correct word.

(C) :- here 'grip' is the correct word. The meaning of 'grip' is 'hold, clutch, catch'. 'from the grip of the Congress' forms a meaningful phrase.

(D) :- here 'strongman' is the correct word. The meaning of 'strongman' is 'a leader who rules by the exercise of threats, force, or violence'. Since the leader is using wrong measures to acquire the post, hence 'strongman' is the correct word.

(E) :- here 'desperate' is the correct word. 'desperate measures' here mean the 'extreme measures' adopted by BJP leader.

Correct sentence - 'Unable to reconcile himself to the failure to wrest Karnataka from the grip of the Congress in last year's Assembly election, the BJP strongman is adopting desperate measures to get another shot at becoming Chief Minister.'

**Sol 352.**

context, the word is used in statement B which refers to this force present in the moon.

The word *gravity* also means the seriousness or importance of something. So, it is correctly used in statement C.

Statement A makes no sense. The word *gravity* does not fit contextually. The most possible substitute is the word *regime* which means a coordinated and ordered way of doing things:

**Statement A:** You can personalize your training regime within the app based on experience levels.

Thus, the correct answer is option 1.

**Sol 353.**

Words A and D, and C and E have been interchanged.

(A) :- here 'midst' is the correct word. The meaning of 'midst' is 'in the middle'. 'report comes in the midst of a vigorous campaign' forms a meaningful phrase, as it tells that the report by CAG comes in the middle of a strong campaign by the Opposition.

(C) :- here 'revelations' is the correct word. The meaning of 'revelation' is 'a surprising and previously unknown fact that has been disclosed to others'. 'based on media revelations about' forms a meaningful phrase, as it tells that media brought out some unknown facts.

(D) :- here 'lapses' is the correct word. The meaning of 'lapses' is 'intervals or gaps'. 'possible lapses and deviations' forms a meaningful phrase. With 'deviation' we need a word that is similar to it. 'midst' has no connection with 'deviation'.

(E) :- here 'dissenting' is the correct word. The meaning of 'dissenting' is 'holding or expressing opinions that are at variance with those commonly or officially held'. 'dissenting members of the INT' forms a meaningful phrase as it tells that members of the INT are not happy with the process.

**Correct sentence -** 'The report of the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India tabled in Parliament comes in the midst of a vigorous campaign by the Opposition that is questioning the process, based on media revelations about possible lapses and deviations and significant points raised by dissenting members of the Indian Negotiating Team (INT).'

**Sol 355.**

Correct option: 2.

The word 'rised' has been used incorrectly. The correct word should be 'caused' in this sentence since the food abundance has led to an explosion in the insect population in this area.

**Sol 356.**

The correct option is option 2.

Eventually- Ultimately  
Minuscule- a little amount  
Exuberant- Plentiful

**Sol 357.**

Antithesis is a noun referring to a person or a thing that is a direct opposite of another.

Sentences B and C use the term correctly, in sentence A however according to the context the correct word should be the opposite of antithesis that is replica.

**Sol 358.**

None of the options convey the full meaning.

Eye-witness is not a passerby or a passive observer but someone who has seen with his own eyes and was thus involved in the crime scene. The words 'bystander', 'observer' and 'onlooker' means a non-participating person.

Evidence is a very strong proof and not just a suggestion or idea. The words 'suggestion', 'verification' and 'support' do not match this meaning.

To grant means to give formally or legally and fits in well with this sentence. No replacement is needed.

**Sol 359.**

The word serial means repeated patterns or sequences.

Destruction means the process of causing damage to something that it no longer exists or that it cannot be repaired.

Both B and C are correct and convey the right meaning. In Option A, 'many' means several and 'sadness' means feeling

sorrow which is the effect of the destruction and does not adequately convey the proper meaning of the word, hence this is incorrect.

Wailing means crying with pain or grief and this captures the essence of the sentence correctly and hence can be retained.

**Sol 360.**

All three sentences are grammatically and contextually correct. Harrowing means "acutely distressing" which can be an adjective for costumes, silence, and a story.

Hence the correct answer is option 1.

**Sol 361.**

Only sentence B is correct.

Misogynistic means "strongly prejudiced against women", which is a characteristic of a peace treaty and not a feeling or contextually the nature of a 'peace person'.

Correct words for other sentences

The assassination could do serious damage to the fragile peace agreement that was signed last month.

I felt rather fatigued for a few days after the operation.

Hence the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 362.**

Sentences A and B are correct.

Famished means "extremely hungry". In sentence C, 'famished' has been used as an adjective for an evening, which is incorrect.

Hence the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 363.**

The word 'logging' which means 'the activity or business of selling trees and cutting and preparing the timber' has been spelt incorrectly here. Thus option 2 is the correct answer.

Ligneous => woody

**Sol 364.**

Correct option - 3

Let's check the meanings of the bold words and their meanings:-  
During - Throughout the duration.

Strange - Weird; unusual.

Jolt - A shake caused by sudden force.

Rushed - Ran; moved.

Since, with reference to the context, people cannot hear any shake, it can be felt. Whereas, a noise can be heard. So, we can replace jolt with noise.

Correct sentence - During earthquake people heard a strange noise and rushed out of their houses.

**Sol 365.**

The error is in part 3 of the given sentence.

The preposition 'in' is incorrectly used here.

It should be 'for'.

The correct phrase will be: '...economists was for annual growth...'

**Sol 366.** The error is in option 1 as the correct spelling is -- millennium--mill+en+niium. meaning 'a century' or a 100 hundred years.

**Sol 367.**

The correct answer is option 2- Embarrassed



Explanation

The error is in option 2 as the correct spelling is 'embarrassed' which means cause (someone) to feel awkward, self-conscious, or ashamed.

**Sol 368.**

Correct option - 3

With respect to the context, the word 'daughters' is not appropriate. Since, 'movie' is a favourite of daughter. Hence, it shows a relation or possession between these two nouns. So, we need to use possessive noun instead of plural noun. Thus, 'daughters' will be changed to 'daughter's'. So, option 3 is the correct answer.

Correct sentence - The movie 1001 Dalmatians is my daughter's favorite movie.

**Sol 369.**

In the given question, the words 'indigestion', 'ulcers', 'condition' are correct.

However, the word 'underline' is incorrect in the given context. It means 'to draw a line under (a word or phrase) to give emphasis or indicate special type.'

It should be replaced with the word 'underlying', which means 'to be the cause or basis of (something).'

**Sol 370.**

The word 'facing' is the incorrect form of the word in the given grammatical structure of the sentence. The correct form of the word should be 'faced'. Thus the correct option should be option 3.

**Sol 371.**

The word 'substantiated' means provide evidence to support or prove the truth of. This does not make any sense in the current context of the sentence and should be replaced by the most appropriate 'substantial' which means of considerable importance, size, or worth.

Thus the correct option should be option 2.

**Sol 372.**

The word 'most' is irrelevant in the sentence because 'greatest' is in the superlative degree and does not need another superlative degree word before it.

Thus, the correct option should be option 2.

**Sol 373.**

Let's have a look at the spellings used in the above given sentence:

Exciting means stimulating.

Spacious means roomy.

Studies is the third person form of the verb 'to study'.

Clauses should be replaced by *classes* as it conveys the correct meaning and usage.

Hence, option 3 is the correct answer.

**Sol 374.**

Out of the given words, only rivile is spelt incorrectly. Given the context, its correct spelling should be revile.

To **induce**- bring about or give rise to.

To **revile**- criticize in an abusive or angrily insulting manner.

Benefactor- a person who gives money or other help to a person or cause.

Provocation- ction or speech that makes someone angry, especially deliberately.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 375.**

Out of the given words, only astunished is spelt incorrectly. Given the context, its correct spelling should be astonished.

**Jovial**- cheerful and friendly.

**Conviction**- a firmly held belief or opinion.

Vehemence- great forcefulness or intensity of feeling or expression.

To be **astonished**- greatly surprised or impressed; amazed.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 376.**

Out of the given words, only disaprobation is spelt incorrectly.

Given the context, its correct spelling should be disapprobation.

To **squeal**- a long, high-pitched cry or noise.

**Forth**- forward, out and away from a starting point.

**Disapprobation**- strong disapproval, typically on moral grounds.

**Saddle**- a seat fastened on the back of a horse or other animal for riding.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 377.**

Out of the given words, only surruptitious is spelt incorrectly.

Given the context, its correct spelling should be surreptitious.

**Surreptitious**- kept secret, especially because it would not be approved of.

To **appear**- come into sight; become visible or noticeable, especially without apparent cause.

To **blink**- shut and open the eyes quickly.

To **fathom**- understand (a difficult problem or an enigmatic person) after much thought.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.


**Sol 378.**

The correct answer is All are incorrect

 **Key-Points**

Let's look at the following points-

- Going through the all given option we find that all given sentences are incorrect
- It concludes that option 5 is correct and therefore the answer.

 **Important Point**

Now, let's look at the following points-

- Option 1 is incorrect as the conjunction used for adverb 'both' is 'and'; whereas in the given context 'as well as'
- Option 2 is incorrect as the conjunction for the adverb scarcely is paired with when and in the context then is mentioned
- Option 3 is incorrect as it uses the wrong format comprises of; It should be 'comprises' or 'is comprised of'.
- Option 4 is incorrect for the reason, If both the auxiliary verb and the main verb come in a sentence, *the adverb of frequency/ degree* is put between the auxiliary verb and the main verb; whereas in the given sentence it is given just after the subject i.e.they always had treated
  - For e.g.- They had rarely arrived late at work until yesterday.

**Sol 380.**

- The correct answer is option 3.
- The correct sentence is 'Countless doctors across the world are urging consumers to take Turmeric Curcumin on a daily basis. Not only does it relieve arthritis and joint pain, but it also has many other amazing benefits.'
- In the above sentence, the use of the article 'an' before the disease arthritis is incorrect.
- Diseases do not take articles before them except a few exceptions.

**Sol 381.**

- The correct answer is Option 2.
- The error lies in wrong usage of the subject-verb agreement.
- In Part B, replace 'was' with were because here two individual subjects are connected by 'and' so the subject is in plural and the verb should also be in plural.
- **RULE:** When the subject of the sentence is composed of two or more nouns or pronouns connected by and, use a plural verb.

**Sol 382.**

The correct answer is 'C' i.e. error lies in this part of the sentence.

 **Key-Points**

In part C of the sentence the usage of 'there' is incorrect Instead of it use 'their'

- 'There' is an adverb of place and 'their' is a possessive pronoun.
- In the given sentence, the usage of 'their' is correct because we need to tell the possession of the climbers.
- Let's see an example-
  - Janis and Kurt have announced their engagement.

- Thus, the correct answer is No error.



### Mistake Point

One might tend to think that there is an error in part C in the phrase 'into the woods.' When we talk of a person entering a jungle or a forest, we use the preposition 'into'.

The correct sentence is:- *On arriving at the peak of the mountain, the climbers blew their trumpets with joy.*

#### Sol 383.

The correct answer is 'A' i.e. error lies in the first part of the sentence.

### Key-Points

In part A of the sentence, the usage of 'where' is incorrect Instead of it use 'while'

- 'Where' is an adverb usually use to tell the place (Adverb of place) whereas, 'While' is a conjunction usually used to tell the simultaneous actions.
- Let's see an example-
  - Racing was halted for an hour while the track was repaired.

The correct sentence is:- *While the troops were sleeping, the enemy crept up on them and launched an attack.*

#### Sol 384.

The correct answer is option 3, i.e. C.

The error lies in part C.

Since a contrast is expressed in the sentence, the correct conjunction will be 'but' and not 'and.'

The correct sentence is:-

He may be highly didactic and opinionated, but he is too honest and fair minded to be unjust.

**Sol 385.** There are two errors in the sentence. The first part uses the preposition 'as', which is incorrect. The correct preposition should be 'to'. The second part uses the adverb 'again', which should be replaced by the preposition 'against'. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

#### Sol 386.

Correct option - 3

First of all, two contradictory clauses are used in the sentence.

Hence, they should be joined with conjunction but. Hence, options 1, 2 & 5 are eliminated. And, 'game of the Olympics' does not make a meaningful phrase. Hence, option 4 is eliminated.

Thus, option 3 is the correct answer.

#### Sol 387.

The correct answer is No Error

### Key-Points

Reading the above sentence we find that it is free from any error.

- When two actions occur in the past, one after the other, the first action is expressed in *Past Perfect Tense* and the second action is expressed in *Simple Past Tense*.
  - For Example - The patient had died before the doctor came.
    - Here, in the sentence the action of dying of patient had happened before the doctor came, therefore, it will be expressed by past perfect tense and the action of the doctor coming will be expressed by simple past tense.
- In the question sentence, the action of she going to wander in the woods happened after he warned her, therefore, it will be expressed by simple past tense(*went*) and the action of warning her will be in the past perfect tense(*had warned*).

#### Sol 388.

The error is in part A and C of the sentence. While in part A, the sentence formation is wrong, in part C a word is wrongly used. We must use V3 after 'has/have/had.' 'Went' is V2. So 'had never gone' should be the correct formation. On the other hand, 'over' is preposition which means 'above so as to cover or protect.' This can't be used here. The word surrounded itself means, that something is around something. Surrounded can never mean over. We need not use the preposition 'over' at all.

Correct Sentence:

He had never *gone* beyond the beautiful gardens that surrounded *around* his father's palace.

#### Sol 389.

There is an error in the first part and the last part of the sentence.

In part A, artists is a plural noun. So the noun 'kind' should also be plural. Kinds is a noun and it means 'A group of individuals or instances sharing common traits; a category or sort'. On the other hand, 'then' means 'at that time'. But the sentence already says that "they were popular in their time, so it doesn't make sense to write 'forgotten then'. It should be 'forgotten now'. So option 4 is correct.

Correct Sentence:

All *kinds* of artists have come and gone in the last four centuries, popular in their time but forgotten *now*.

#### Sol 390.

1 has an error.

"It is a case of equity markets on emerging economies,"

The use of the preposition 'on' is incorrect in the context of the sentence. The correct preposition to be used is 'in'.

#### Sol 391.

(2) has an error.

'Thank to a rally by video-game makers,'

It should be instead 'thanks to'.

#### Sol 392.

The error is in the Option 4, i.e. 'the most intelligent'.

'Most' should be replaced by 'More'.

'Most' is a superlative degree, and we cannot use superlative degrees to compare two people or things. To compare two things 'more' is used.

#### Sol 393.

Here, the error is in the use of the preposition 'with'. The correct usage is 'according to'. Although both *according* and *accordance* are forms of the same word, they take different prepositions.

Thus the correct sentence is - 'I acted according to his advice yet failed to make a favorable impression.'

#### Sol 394.

Here, 'for' is incorrectly used as we are pointing at a particular time and not duration. If we had added 'the last many years,' then we will add 'for.' Error is in part 1 of the sentence. Here, we will use 'since' instead of 'for'.

The correct sentence will be 'He has been working hard since 2005, and this is a reason why he is receiving all accolades from the Chairman and also recognition in the leading newspapers'. Hence the correct option is 1.

#### Sol 395.

The correct answer is option 2, i.e., 'to the heart, the doctors fearing'.

The given sentence is in the past tense. The word 'fearing' expresses the present tense. Thus, it makes the sentence grammatically incorrect and meaningless.

To correct the sentence, the word 'fearing' should be replaced with 'feared', which is the past form of the word 'fear'.

The correct sentence is:

Since the stab wound was proximal to the heart, the doctors feared that it might have penetrated the outer layer of the man's heart.

**Sol 396.**

The correct answer is option 3, i.e., 'more could be heard'. The word 'more' means 'an additional amount or degree'. In the given sentence, there is no specific amount/quantity in the reference of which the word 'more' could be used. Hence it is incorrect. Also, the given sentence is in the present tense. The phrase 'could be' expresses the past tense. To correct the sentence, the word 'more' should be replaced with 'much', which in general refers to 'a large amount', and the phrase 'could be' should be replaced with 'can be', which expresses the present tense. The correct sentence is:  
The bees are known to bumble so noisily that not much can be heard over their incessant buzzing.

**Sol 397.**

The correct answer is option 2, i.e. B. The error lies in part B. Two singular subjects joined by "as well as" will have a singular verb. Here the verb 'were' is plural: it should have been 'was'.  
Correct sentence:  
Flooding, as well as a power cut, was responsible for most citizens fleeing to neighbouring cities.

**Sol 398.**

The error lies in part 3 only. Parts 1 and 2 are grammatically correct sentences and hence do not require any correction. Part 3 uses 'its' which is incorrect here as the subject is plural. So, it must be 'their'.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 399.**

The correct answer is option 3. The correct phrase we are looking for is *given that*. It is used to mean 'knowing or considering a particular thing'. For example, *I am sensible with money, given that (means : taking the following fact into account) I don't earn that much.* Also, the verb that follows *had* should be in its past participle form (V3). Examples: had eaten, had slept, had taught etc. So, we can eliminate option 2 – *had expected* and *not had expect* is correct.  
Correct sentence: Many had expected that the deputy governor would step down along with Patel given that he was more voluble in his criticism of the government.

**Sol 400.**

The error is in the 2nd part of the sentence. The adjective "choppy: variable or changeable" should be used here instead of the verb "chopped: abolish or reduce the size of (something) in a way regarded as ruthless."  
Hence the correct answer is option 2.  
Correct sentence: Gems and jewellery exports are likely to decline 10-15 per cent year on year in this financial year owing to choppy global economies, high import duty on gold and diamonds, and liquidity crunch in the sector.

**Sol 401.**

Answer: 4  
The plural form 'shortages' must be accompanied by a plural verb 'have.' Eliminate option 5. Similarly, the singular noun form 'shortage' must be accompanied by the singular verb 'is' and not 'are.' Eliminate option 1. Eliminate option 2 because the spelling of 'forcing' is wrong. The correct spelling is 'Forcing'. Option 3 has tense inconsistency with the past tense 'had' as well as the present tense 'have' in the sentence. Eliminate option 3. Hence, option 4 is the answer.

**Sol 402.**

There is a difference between beside and besides. 'Beside' means something which is kept by the side while 'besides' means "in addition to." So, in the above sentence, there is an incorrect usage of beside, which makes error in part 3 of the sentence. Correct sentence will be

'In spite of all the difficulties, Riya is running her business successfully besides working for NGO as a part time volunteer to help the needy women and children'.

**Sol 403.**

The two sentences tell us about a person named Prabhakar. The first sentence tells us that Prabhakar could not pursue engineering. The second sentence tells us about his nativity. It is clear that the second sentence is just an additional information and provides no explanation to why Prabhakar could not pursue engineering. So, we can eliminate phrase (II). Also, there is no element of contrast highlighted in these two sentences. Phrase (III) is also incorrect. We can use phrase (I) in the following manner :  
*Hailing from Melattankadu village in Tamil Nadu's Thanjavur, Prabhakar had to initially sacrifice his dream to pursue engineering.*  
Thus, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 404.**

The correct answer is option 3. The word 'though' means 'despite the fact that'. Both i and iii can be used to join the two sentences correctly, without changing the meaning of the initial sentence. The correct sentences would be: i. Though Peter didn't tell us about the place they were made, he did tell us about the assembly of the products. iii. Peter told us about the assembly of the products, but he failed to tell us about the place they were made. The word 'hence' means 'as a consequence of'. This cannot be used to join both the sentences as it would change the meaning of the initial sentences.  
Thus, the correct answer is option 3, i.e., Both i and iii.

**Sol 405.**

The given sentence has one error, which lies in part B. Part B uses the verb 'is', which is incorrect here. Given that the intended form is 'it inwardly differentiates'; using the 'is' here becomes redundant. None of the other parts have any grammatical errors. So, the error-free parts are ACD. Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.  
Correct sentence:  
*According to Hegel's political views, the political state is rational in so far as it inwardly differentiates itself according to the nature of the Concept.*

**Sol 406.**

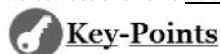
The given sentence has one error, which lies in part D. Part D uses the adverb form 'particularly', which is incorrect. The word refers to the noun 'individuals' and comes directly before it, indicating that it must be an adjective, viz, 'particular'. None of the other parts have any grammatical errors. So, the error-free parts are ABC. Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.  
Correct sentence:  
*The rationality of the state is located in the realization of the universal substantial will in the self-consciousness of particular individuals elevated to consciousness of universality.*

**Sol 407.**

The given sentence has one error, which lies in part D. Part D uses the determiner 'these', which is incorrect here. The determiner 'these' here would be the directly mentioned principles governing the Family while the others would be 'those' governing Civil society. None of the other parts have any grammatical errors. So, the error-free parts are ABC. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.  
Correct sentence:  
*The Third moment of Ethical Life is provided by a synthesis between the principles governing the Family and those governing Civil Society.*

**Sol 408.**

The correct answer is ABD



- The given sentence has one error, which lies in part C.

- The part C uses the noun form 'universe', which is incorrect here.
- We need an adjective to qualify the noun 'will'.
- Will is the determination to do something.
- Something that is universal relates to everyone in the world or everyone in a particular group or society.
- Here 'larger' has been used because 'universal will' is compared with 'subjective rights'.
- So, the error-free parts are ABD.

Thus, the correct sentence is: *Any wrongdoing now becomes an infringement, not merely of the subjective right of individuals but also of the larger universal will that exists in ethical life.*



### Additional Information

- When using *not only . . . but also* in a sentence, parallelism should be the goal.
- It means that the words following both parts of this correlative conjunction (i.e., not only and but also) should belong to the same parts of speech.
- For example, if a verb follows not only, then a verb should also follow but also.
- Using different parts of speech after each part of not only . . . but also makes the sentence imbalanced and, frankly, just awkward. Consider the examples below:
  - He's not only intelligent but also has a great sense of humor. (wrong)
  - He's not only intelligent but also funny. (right)

#### Sol 409.

The given sentence has two errors, which lie in parts C and D. Part C uses the singular verb 'requires', which is incorrect here. As it is two things that are being referred to here, the correct verb form should be plural, 'require'. Part D uses the incorrect verb form 'knew'. As the rest of verbs in the sentence reflect simple present tense, this verb must also be in the present tense form 'know'. Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

#### Sol 410.

The error lies in part 1. The sentence uses a peculiar form. Notice that the 'but' here is used to mean 'only' as well its normal conjunction usage. So, the sentence means, This species not only has 'only' one arm and one leg but it is of such type that also has 'only' one eye and one nostril. Part 1 uses the plural verb 'have', which is incorrect; as it refers to the 'this species', which necessitates a singular verb. So, the correct form would be 'Not only has but'. Therefore, the correct answer is option 1. Note: "To + have" in the third part of the sentence is absolutely correct as it is the infinitive form of the auxiliary verb "to have".

#### Sol 411.

The sentences suggest that the resulting sentence should include the context of 'the teacher correcting her error', 'realising that she had made a mistake' and 'laughing nervously'. The only sentence that expresses the given context is option 5. Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

#### Sol 412.

The sentences suggest that the second sentence happens because of the first sentence. So, they can be joined using conjunctions like 'as' or 'because'. This is given by I. The perfect participle phrase 'having + past participle form of the verb' can also be used here. It shows a completed action and joins the two sentences. This is shown by II. So, a contextually coherent joined sentence is given by I and II. None of the other phrase/s can make the sentence meaningful. Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.

#### Sol 413.

The error lies in the II part of the sentence.

According to the Subject-Verb Agreement rule which states that subjects and verbs must AGREE with one another in number (singular or plural). Thus, if a subject is singular, its verb must also be singular; if a subject is plural, its verb must also be plural. Here the subject is "one" research issue, hence the verb should be singular, i.e. concerns.

Hence the correct answer is option 1.

Correct sentence:

*One of the thorniest research issues developmental researchers face concerns the measurement of change and differences over age and time.*

#### Sol 414.

The error lies in the II part of the sentence.

Since the subject 'body rhythms' is plural, its following verb should also be plural according to the Subject-Verb Agreement rule which states that subjects and verbs must AGREE with one another in number (singular or plural). Hence the verb should be 'govern' and not 'governs'.

Hence the correct answer is option 3.

Correct sentence:

*In the first days of life, infants' body rhythms like waking, eating, sleeping govern the infant's behavior, often at seemingly random times.*

#### Sol 415.

Only part D of the sentence is grammatically correct and hence error-free.

Part A is wrong since the adjective 'genetic: relating to genes or heredity' is used instead of the adverb 'genetically: in a way that relates to genes or genetics.'

Part B is wrong since the preposition 'on' is used instead of the appropriate preposition 'to'.

Part C is wrong since the preposition 'with' is used instead of the appropriate preposition 'from'.

Hence the correct answer is option 4.

#### Sol 416.

The correct option is option 2.



### Key-Points

- The error is in 2nd part.
- The same verb can be used for two different subjects only when the subjects are in the same number.
- Here, the same verb 'were closed' is used for two different subjects- 'major buildings', which is a plural subject, and 'the Parliament house', which is a singular subject.
- As the subjects differ in their number, the same verb can't be used for them.
- We need to use the correct form of the verb for the singular subject i.e. *was*.

Thus, the correct sentence will be *'Major buildings were closed and the Parliament house was sealed as soon as news of the intended terror attack spread.'*

#### Sol 417.

The correct option is option 3 as 'model' is incorrectly spelt as 'modal'.

'Model' means **'a person or thing regarded as an excellent example of a specified quality'**.

'Modal' means 'relating to mode or form as opposed to substance'. 'Sought' is the past tense of 'seek', which means 'to attempt to find (something)'.

**Sol 418.** The error lies in part B of the sentence as the verb 'perceive' is incorrect here and must be replaced with the adjective 'perceived' as it acts upon the noun 'influences.' It should read as: *..remove perceived bourgeois.'*

#### Sol 419.

The error is in sentence A as the preposition 'on' is not needed after the word 'emphasizes'. The adverb 'how' has been used here thus the emphasis is on that. It should read as:

*'The official conference document emphasizes how much progress has been made.'*

Option 1 is the correct answer.

**Sol 420.**

The error is in sentence C as the preposition 'at' after the word 'maim' is incorrect and should be eliminated. The word 'maim' means 'to injure someone so severely that the body part stops working.' It should read as: 'Armed groups continued to kill and maim children and target schools.'  
Option 3 is thus the correct answer.

**Sol 421.**

The correct answer is: D

 **Key-Points**

- The error in D is the word 'governmental' which needs to be replaced with the word 'government' to make the sentence correct
- All other sentences are grammatically correct

The tense and the sentence structure is grammatically correct.

**Sol 423.**

The sentences tell us that Berkeley Earth, which is a respected scientific organization, has come up with some news and it's the only one which came up with this news. The sentence expresses a surprising tone at this point because the author tells us that such news (milestones) should be told by the American government also.

The correct sentence is the one which keeps this meaning intact. Option 1 is incorrect as it twists the meaning slightly. The unusual aspect is not because of the fact that Berkeley Earth is a respected scientific organization.

Options 2 and 4 can be eliminated as the pronoun *it* is used first in the sentence. The correct grammatical structure introduces the proper noun before the pronoun.

Option 3 makes sense. Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 424.**

Option 4 can be eliminated as it makes no logical sense. Use of *though* is done when introducing a contradiction or contrast. Participation in an event called 'Code for Good Hackathon' does not provide any contrast to the fact that he was earning a bachelor's degree in the science of information systems.

Option 1 is also eliminated because it suggests that participation in the event led him to earn a bachelor's degree. This is not the expected meaning.

Compared with all other options, option 2 makes a perfect logical sense. It suggests that Mathew, who participated in his first 'Code for Good Hackathon' was a student at Stony Brook University, earning a bachelor's degree in the science of information systems.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 425.**

Out of the given sentences, the only correct sentence is 2. 'There being' is passive form of 'there is'. It focuses attention on the action itself and not on the subject or object doing the action. Dearth means insufficiency or lack of something. None of the other sentences are grammatically sound.

- The error in part B lies with the use of 'being' which is a verb of present tense and instead the correction will be the use of 'as', implying like such.
- *As, because and since* are conjunctions. *As, because and since* all introduce subordinate clauses. They connect the result of something with its reason.
- The error in part C lies with the wrong tense use of 'has' when it should instead be 'had', agreeing with the past perfect tense in the sentence.
- "Had" is used in a sentence in the past perfect tense.
- Simply stating, had is used when the sentence shows an action already completed in the past.
  - *She had scored the first rank.*
  - *I had a great time with you.*

Correct sentence: "Heaviness in the air was clearly obvious as the forensics department had cleaned the room for evidence and

other official duties."

**Sol 429.**

The error in part A is the use of 'in' when it should instead be 'into' because it explain the process or movement of transition, usually from one place to another. The error in part D is the use of singular dog when in the latter half 'they awoke' indicates there were multiple dogs. The correction will be dogs.

Correct sentence:

They could easily slip *into* the house without raising any suspicion for the first few minutes, until hell broke loose with the dogs spotting them as they awoke.

**Sol 430.** The error in C is the preposition 'against' after the word 'oppose', which needs to be omitted. The subject can be directly mentioned after the word 'oppose.' Option 3 is thus the correct answer.

**Sol 431.**

The Error is in Part B of the sentence. We need to use the pair of "whether and or" together in a sentence. So the use of "if and or" is wrong. So option 2 is correct.

Correct sentence: I can't confirm whether he has left the building or he is still inside.

**Sol 432.** The Error is in **Part C** of the sentence. **Between** is used when only two parties are available. Here European countries refer to all European countries. So we must use "**among**." So option 3 is correct.

**Sol 433.** The most visible error in these sentences is the use of "shows" after a plural noun "developments." Since developments is plural we must use "**show**." Moreover, another striking error is the use of the word "ruling." While, "rules" mean "one of a set of explicit or understood regulations or principles governing conduct or procedure within a particular area of activity" "ruling" means "an

authoritative decision or pronouncement, especially one made by a judge." So we can understand that in this sentence, we must use the word "rules". So option 2 is correct.

**Sol 434.**

The error is in parts I and II.  
In the given sentence, Part I contains the noun 'day' which must be qualified by an adjective. While both 'tired' and 'tiring' are adjectives, we can use them differently. 'Tired' is used to describe one's condition, or a person. 'Tiring' is used to describe an activity, or something that makes you feel tired, e.g. a long tiring day.  
In the given sentence, Part II the verb 'have' does not agree with the subject in number. 'Shashi has' is grammatically correct.  
In the given sentence, Part III is grammatically correct and does not require any correction.  
Therefore, the correct option is 3. Both I and II.  
Correct sentence: Even after a long tiring day at office, Shashi has to drive his car today while coming back home as his driver is absent.

**Sol 435.**

Correct sentence: Suddenly a fire broke out in the congested market resulting in chaos followed by a stampede killing hundreds of people including women and children.  
Congested is the correct form of the adjective that should be used here.  
Hence the correct answer is option 1.

**Sol 436.**

Correct sentence: The video shows that a parade of elephants is marching across the road and all vehicles are parked at a safe distance as per the instructions of the guide during a safari in the National Park.  
Hence the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 437.**

Correct sentence: To score good marks in the examination, Ram is preparing all the lessons very well and is also practising the numerical problems given in the exercises of the textbook.  
Hence the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 438.**

The error in the given sentence lies in part 1 and can be replaced by the grammatically correct option I. No other parts of the sentence require correction.  
Hence, option 1 is correct.  
Correct sentence:  
*Being adept in business administration, the present chairman of XYZ company took several witty and strategic decisions which not only gave financial stability to the company but also took the company to the next level of success and reputation.*

**Sol 439.**

Correct sentence: *After cycling for two hours in the hot and humid weather, Ranjan fainted because of excessive dehydration and fatigue.*

**Sol 440.**

There is no error in the given sentence.  
*Exit poll results (plural) hence the pronoun 'them'.*

**Sol 441.**

The correct option is **option 3**.

It should not be 'was' in part C.

Instead of that, it should be '**were**' because here we are talking about more than one thing.

**Sol 442.**

Correct sentence: Sidhu is a versatile genius and with his multifarious skills and personality he has easily drawn the attention of professors and students, including seniors, towards him, just after joining the college.

**Sol 443.**

The correct option is **option 1**.

It should not be 'Whether' in part A.

Instead of that, it should be '**Either**' because here an option is presented.

**Sol 444.**

The correct option is **option 2**.

It should not be 'at' in part B.

Instead of that, it should be '**over**' because here a time span is mentioned.

**Sol 445.**

The correct option is **option 3- Only B**

*When two actions occur in the past, the one which occurs earlier takes the past perfect tense and the one which occurs later takes the simple past tense. A person can become angry only after he has been duped. Thus, simple present 'is' in part B must be replaced with past perfect 'had been'.*  
The corrections given in A and C are grammatically and contextually incorrect.

As we can see first part of the sentence is exactly correct because with the helping verb has + v3 is always used  
The three forms of become is Become / Became / Become  
Option 2 is the correct answer.

**Sol 475.**

The correct answer is option 3.  
The conjunction *however* is used to express surprise by introducing a statement that contradicts or contrasts with something that has been said previously.  
So, we can join sentences C and D using *however* as sentence D introduces a contrast to what is discussed in C.

Out of the given sentences, the only correct sentence is given by option 3.  
None of the other sentences are grammatically sound.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

- There is an error in the subject-verb agreement of the sentence.
- The subject 'Love and Poetry' is singular since it's a proper noun and thus the verb should be singular as well.

Therefore the verb 'were' in the first part of the sentence needs to be replaced with 'was' to agree with the singular subject.  
Correct sentence: *'Love and Poems' was the name of the book recently published by our publishing house.* ✓

### Additional Information

- The difference between 'who' and 'whom' is a matter of case. There are three cases for personal pronouns: nominative, objective, and possessive.
- The nominative case is used when the pronoun is the subject of a verb.
- The objective case is used when the pronoun is an object — either of a verb or a preposition.
- The possessive case pronouns are used to show, well, possession.
- The pronoun *who* is in the nominative case, and *whom* is in the objective case. (*whose* is the possessive case). This means you use *who* when it's the subject of the verb:
  - *Who decapitated the Barbie doll?*
- And *whom* is used as the object of verbs and prepositions (those are the only parts of speech that have objects):
  - *The buffalo stampede trampled whom? (Whom is the object of the verb trampled.)*
  - *Do not ask for whom the bell tolls. (Whom is the object of the preposition for.)*

It should read as: '*Despite peace proposals put forth by the Arab League and United Nations, the conflict only increased as additional factions joined the armed resistance.*'  
Option 1 is the correct answer.

**Sol 488.**

The correct answer is option 2, i.e. B.

The error lies in part B.

'Each' is a distributive pronoun calling attention to the individuals forming the collection and must accordingly be followed by verbs in the singular.

Correct sentence: *Each of the students of Modern school has not done well in the engineering entrance examinations.*

**Sol 489.**

The correct answer is 'B' i.e. error lies in part B of the sentence.

### Key-Points

In part B of the sentence, the usage of 'I' is incorrect instead of it use 'me'

- According to grammar, a preposition takes a prepositional object and an object is always a noun/pronoun/gerund also it should be in an objective case.

- In the given sentence 'to' is a preposition and Jack is a proper noun and 'I' is a pronoun which should come in an objective case i.e. 'me'
- The object of a verb or preposition, when it is a pronoun, should be in the objective form.

So the correct sentence is: *I pleaded with the warden to let Jack and me go to the theatre to watch the latest Western film.*

**Sol 490.**

For eg: The forces of the Southern States defeated the Mughals.  
Option 3 is the correct answer.

**Sol 493.**

Correct answer is Option 2

'inequality' should be replaced with 'inequalities', as we have plural subject.

**Sol 494.**

The correct answer is option 3, i.e. C.

The error lies in part C.

'Either' is a distributive pronoun calling attention to the individuals forming the collection and must accordingly be followed by verbs in the singular.

Correct sentence: *He was asked whether either of the two sisters was at home.*

**Sol 495.**

The correct answer is option 3, i.e. D.

The error lies in part D.

The word 'prior' takes the word 'to' immediately after it.

Correct sentence:

*The assassination of former Prime Minister Indira Gandhi was prior to the Kargil war.*

**Sol 496.**

### Key-Points

- The error is in part 2 of the sentence.
- According to the 'Proximity rule' of Subject-verb agreement, when a compound subject contains both a singular and a plural noun or pronoun joined by "or" or

"hor," the verb should agree with the part of the subject that is closest to the verb. This is also called the rule of proximity.

Options ii cannot act as a link. "Moving away from here considering that the storm is approaching" is not a correct sentence.

**Sol 502.**

The error in (A) is the absence of the word 'than' after the word 'rather.' 'Rather than' means 'used with the infinitive form of a verb to indicate negation as a contrary choice.' It should read as: 'While it is probably better to rely on markets rather than..'

The error in (B) is the word 'mean' in singular form after the word 'does'. With 'does' the verb is always in plural form 'mean'. It should read as: '... government to set pay levels, that doesn't mean that the way ..'

Option 2 is the correct answer.

**Sol 503.**

The correct answer is 3.

In Part (A) of the sentence, the phrasal 'hold in' has been used incorrectly as it means to suppress, and not the same as 'hold on', which means 'to not give up'. So instead, the proper phrasal verb should be 'hold on'.

In Part (C) of the sentence, the word 'forgot' has been used in the past tense though the sentence is in the present tense and so it is incorrect. Instead, it should be 'forget'.

Hence, the error is in the AC part and the correct sentence would be:

**Sometimes we hold on to our past so dearly that we forget all about the present moment.**

**Sol 504.**

The error lies in part D.

In part C, "answerable is used" which is followed by the preposition "to". In this sentence, it is followed by the preposition "in" which is grammatically incorrect.

- Whenever we are comparing and "than" is present in the statement then we will use the comparative degree.
- And, we use a superlative to say that a thing or person is the most of a group.
- When we use a superlative adjective ('the tallest student') before the noun, we generally use it with 'the'.
- This is because there's only one (or one group) of the thing we are talking about.

**Sol 506.**

In the given sentences,

The verb used is simple present tense form 'speak', so the corresponding noun must be present in its plural form, viz, 'commentators'.

So, 1 and 4 cannot be correct.

'Unanimous' means fully in agreement. But, since it is used directly after the verb, it must be in its adverb form 'unanimously'.

So, 3 cannot be correct.  
Out of options 2 and 5,  
The form 'its been' is grammatically incorrect. So, 5 is also incorrect.

Only ii can be used to begin the sentence- Although the restaurant has the best kitchen in town, their staff is quite rude.  
Options i and iii cannot act as a link.  
Thus the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 510.**

The correct answer is option 2.  
Only i and iii can be used to begin the sentence correctly, without changing the meaning of the initial sentences. The word 'though' is used to indicate 'despite the fact that'. The phrase 'notwithstanding the fact that' also indicates the same thing. It joins the two sentences meaningfully.  
The correct sentences would be:  
i. Though it was snowing outside, we went for a walk.  
iii. Notwithstanding the fact that it was snowing outside, we went for a walk.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 2, i.e., i and iii.

Option B uses the necessary connector for to give a grammatically correct sentence and imply the same meaning as expressed in the question statements.

Hence the correct answer is option 3.

The given sentence is in the 3rd person present tense, i.e., 'present tense in which the subject is either he, she, or it (for singular) or they (for plural)'. Since the sentence uses 'he', it is in the third person present tense.  
We use 'do' when the subject is 'I, you, we or they'. Since this is not the case, the use of the word 'do' makes the sentence grammatically incorrect.

The correct sentence is:  
You will sprain your ankle if you twist it too far in a direction it's not supposed to go.

**Sol 522.**

The correct answer is option 3, i.e., 'as such, he always seek'.  
The given sentence is in the past tense. Thus, the use of the word 'seek', which is in the present tense, is incorrect. It makes the sentence grammatically incorrect.  
To correct the sentence, the word 'seek' should be replaced with 'sought', which is in the past tense.  
The correct sentence is:  
My father believed wisdom came from his matrilineal influences, and as such, he always sought advice from women in his family.

**Sol 523.**

1st part of the sentence is erroneous.-- Option 1--a-- is the answer.  
It should be This State's unemployment rate as possession is denoted using an apostrophe.


**Sol 524.**

The correct answer is option 2.

 **Key-Points**

- The error is in the 2nd part of the sentence.
- A gerund phrase will begin with a gerund, an -ing word, and will include other modifiers and/or objects. Gerund phrases always function as nouns, so they will be subjects, subject complements, or objects in the sentence.
  - Eg: Eating ice cream on a windy day can be a messy experience if you have long, untamed hair.
  - *Eating ice cream on a windy day* = subject of the verb 'can be'.
- In the above question the subject is 'swimming in heated pools'.
- A gerund phrase is always singular and the verb that follows it should be singular too. Hence 'is' should be used instead of 'are'.

Since the sentence talks about the importance of the learning of an individual, 'is measured' should be used for the same.

Sol 534.

The error is in the 2nd part of the sentence.

The past tense of verb 'arise' has to be used which is 'arose'. The question refers to an event that occurred in the past, so the verbs should be in simple past tense. The simple past tense shows that you are talking about something that has already happened.

Unlike the past continuous tense, which is used to talk about past events that happened over a period of time, the simple past tense emphasizes that the action is finished.

The second part uses the pronoun and determiner 'whose', which is incorrect since it is only used to refer to individuals and not things. The correct determiner pronoun here should be 'which'. The third sentence has no errors. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

Sol 538. The sentence has two errors. The second part uses the present perfect continuous tense, with the past participle of 'be' form 'been'. Whenever a continuous tense is used, the verb is used with the suffix '-ing'. The third part uses the comparative adverb form of 'far', which is 'farther'. It is incorrect here, since it is generally used to describe a distance. The correct word to be used here is 'further', which also a comparative adverb form; but is used to mean 'more' or 'more than'. There is no error in part 1. Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

Sol 539. The sentence has one error. The part I uses the simple present verb 'gives', which is incorrect. The correct form of the word becomes 'giving', the present continuous tense, since the sentence uses the preposition 'with'. There are no other errors. Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.

Sol 540. The sentence has one error. The part III of the sentence uses the preposition 'as', which is used to signify a function of something. The correct word to be used here is the preposition 'under', which is apt here. There are no errors in the other two parts. Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

Sol 541. There are two errors in the sentence. The first part contains two sentences that are independent but are not joined by a punctuation mark or a conjunction. A grammatically correct sentence would contain either of the two. The second part uses the preposition 'of', which is incorrect since normalcy is a state that would be restored 'to' or 'in' a place. The third part has no errors. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

Sol 542.

The correct answer is option 1, i.e., 'Each disciple were seated'. The word 'were' is used with plural words or to refer to singular subjects. Here, the subject is 'each disciple', which is singular. Therefore, the use of the word 'were' makes the sentence grammatically incorrect.

Sol 543.

The error is in the 3rd part of the sentence.

According to the Subject-Verb Agreement rule, two or more singular (or plural) subjects joined by 'and' act as a plural compound subject and take a plural verb (singular + singular = plural). Hence the verb should be 'pile up' and not 'piles up'. Here, 'water' and 'refuse' are two subjects and they need a plural noun 'pile' after them.

Hence the correct answer is option 3.



### Additional Information

Refuse(noun): waste matter

Sol 544.

The error lies in part D of the sentence as the verb 'lasts' is incorrect and must be replaced with 'last'.

With simple future tense, the verb is always used in plural form. It should read as: '*musical project that will last for 1000 years.*'

Option 4 is the correct answer.

**Sol 545.**

The error lies in part 4 of the sentence as the word 'renown' is incorrect and the adjective to be used here is 'renowned.' The sentence should have an adjective here.

The correct is 3. There is an error in the subject verb agreement of the sentence. The subject of the sentence is 'masterpiece' is singular and thus the verb too should singular. So the verb 'were' in the third part of the sentence needs to be replaced with 'was' to agree with the singular subject.

**Sol 557.**

The error lies in part 4 of the sentence as the preposition 'in' is incorrect and must be replaced with the preposition 'of' as a sense 'of' something is instilled or portrayed. For eg: A sense of justice was popularized among the people when the case was printed on the paper. It should read as: '*The reputation Canadian troops earned, along with the success of Canadian flying aces including William George Barker and Billy Bishop, helped to give the nation a new sense of identity.*' Option 4 is the correct answer.

**Sol 558.**

The error lies in part 4 of the sentence as the phrasal verb 'look back' means 'think about the past' and it makes no sense here. The correct phrasal verb to be used is 'look around' which means 'inspect a building or place'. For eg: I need to look around the place in order to get a good flat. It should read as: '*I have already informed him that we have liked the house and are thinking of looking around tomorrow.*' Option 4 is the correct answer.

**Sol 559.**

The error lies in part 1 of the sentence as the verb 'has' cannot be used with the preposition 'to' and must be replaced with 'have.' For eg: I need to have a new bag for carrying my books. It should read as: '*The emirate aims to have the world's first blockchain-powered government by 2020, and also wants to become the world's 3D-printing hub.*' Option 1 is the correct answer.

**Sol 560.**

The error lies in part 1 of the sentence as the verb 'achieves' is incorrect here and must be written in plural form 'achieve'. With 'can' the verb is always used in plural form. Eg: I can read the whole article in an hour. She can prepare delicious food. It should read as: '*No country can achieve sustainable economic development without substantial investment in human capital.*' Option 1 is the correct answer.

**Sol 561.**

The error lies in part 3 of the sentence as the adjective 'different' is incorrect here and must be replaced with the adverb 'differently' as it acts upon the verb 'treat.' Adverbs are used to define verbs and adjectives are used to define nouns. For eg: She was walking slowly.(adverb) Her walk was slow. (adjective) It should read as: '*Full integration with the rest of India would promote development, and insists that there's no reason to treat Jammu and Kashmir differently either because it has a Muslim majority or because it is claimed by Pakistan.*' Option 3 is the correct answer.

**Sol 562.**

The error lies in part 4 of the sentence as the preposition 'in' is incorrect and must be replaced with 'for' to make the sentence correct. 'Last for' conveys the correct meaning which means 'to continue.' For eg: The program lasted for five hours.

Correct Sentence: Following the funeral, people clashed with troops and it set off a deadly cycle of violence that lasted ~~in~~/ for days.

It means the violence continued for many days.  
Option 4 is the correct answer.

**Sol 563.**

Correct Option - 1

- The answer is 4) B and C since we have to find the error-free parts.
- In part A of the sentence: *She go* is wrong. *She goes*.
- In part D of the sentence: Both clauses can't be in the future tense. *I am not greedy but I will take..* This is a conditional sentence, the tense in the "if" clause is the simple present, and the tense in the main clause is the simple future.

- The simple future tense indicates that an action is in the future relative to the speaker or writer. There are no inflected forms for the future in English (nothing like those -ed or -s endings in the other tenses). The formula for the future simple is will + V (Base form).
- Positive Sentence: S + will + V(Base form) + object...  
◦ Example: *I will go to Thailand.*
- Negative Sentence: S + will not/won't + V(Base form) + object...  
◦ Example: *I will not go to Thailand.*
- Question form: Will + S + V(Base form) + ...?  
◦ Example: *Will you go to Thailand?*

 **Mistake Point**

- As a general rule, use 'will' for affirmative and negative sentences about the future. Use 'will' for requests too.
- If you want to make an offer or suggestion with I/we, use 'shall' in the question form. For very formal statements, especially to describe obligations, use 'shall'.

**Sol 593.**

The error lies in part 1.  
The sentence uses the form 'had they seen us', which is used to show a possibility of something happening, which means this conjunction 'had' is used synonymously with the conditional conjunction 'if'.  
Whenever we use the conjunction 'had', there is no need to use the auxiliary verb again in the sentence. i.e. 'had they seen us' (which means if they had seen us) is correct and not 'had they had seen us'. The second 'had' is redundant here.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.  
The corrected sentence is: **Had they seen us misappropriate their belongings they would have been enraged.**

**Sol 594.**

The error lies in A and C.  
The word 'but' has been incorrectly placed in A and should be placed before the word 'two'. It means except the two cities.  
The error in C is the subject-verb disagreement. The subject here is plural which is 'parts of the country' thus the verb should be 'have' and not 'has'.  
Thus option 1 is the correct answer.

**Sol 595.**

The correct answer is **Option 2 i.e. error lies in part 2nd of the sentence.**

 **Key-Points**

- **No sooner--than** is a phrase of 'soon' used to convey that the second event mentioned happens immediately after the first.
- when the sentence starts with No sooner, hardly, scarcely, or by the other adverbs, we use the inversion form of the subject-verb.
  - **Let's see an example:**
    - Hardly had I got into bed when the telephone rang.

Hence the correct sentence is- *No sooner had I finished the meal than I started feeling sick.*

For example: I am going over to his house in the afternoon. He is coming over to my place in the afternoon.  
Thus, it can be inferred from the above examples, that possessive pronouns determine whether 'coming over' or 'going over' will be used in a sentence.  
Correct sentence:

He is *coming over* for dinner, at my apartment on Friday.

**Sol 599.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is 1.  
The only preposition that can make the sentence meaningful is 'by' declining and not 'from' or 'in' declining something.  
Declination is the noun form of the verb 'to decline', which is only used in old or formal English. Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.

**Sol 600.** The error lies in part 3 of the sentence as the adjective 'extensive' is incorrect after the verb 'reported' and must be replaced with the adverb 'extensively'. It should read as: 'In the first two weeks of September, corporate media outlets have reported **extensively** on the crisis.'

**Sol 601.**

The correct answer is 'Option 1', i.e. 'The biggest'.  
'The' is used **to refer to specific or particular nouns**, and in the given sentence, **'The country...'** is already specified so there is no need to specify **'biggest forged wheel factory'**.  
**'The biggest'** should be replaced by **'biggest'**.

**Sol 602.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is 2.  
The sentence refers to a particular place, the asylum, so the only correct conjunction here could be 'whenever', meaning 'at any time'. 'Wherever' cannot be used as it means 'any place'.  
Death refers to a specific occasion, so the prepositions 'within' or 'towards' cannot be correct. The correct preposition here must be 'before'.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 603.**

Correct option - 2  
Since, word area is a noun which cannot be followed by gerund scattering directly. Because gerund is a verb which acts as a noun and two nouns don't come together except in some cases. Hence, replace scattering with scattered which acts as an adjective here. Hence, options 1, 3 & 5 are eliminated. Now, verb flown is the third form of fly. The error is in part (1) of the sentence.  
It can wither be 'You did not listen' or 'You were not listening'.  
The helping verbs did/were both indicate past tense.  
'Did' is for simple past tense and is used with the second form of the verb.  
'Were' is for past continuous tense and is used with the -ing for of the verb.

**Sol 606.**

The sentence is in the form:  
Subject + indirect object + object + verb  
The **verb** in the beginning of the sentence should then influence or affect the other verbs. Since the to-be verb "is" is of present form and so the verbs that follow should be of present form too.

The correct version of this sentence will be: *The department ensures that every content project fits perfectly into the company's overall marketing strategy.*  
Therefore, the error is in option 1.

**Sol 610.**

In the given sentence, the first part talks about not liking the movie while the second part praises certain parts of it.  
The phrase 'due to' doesn't make sense here since it is used to mean 'caused by' or 'because of' something.  
The correct version of the sentence will be: *To be honest, I really didn't like the movie even though the acting was good and the music was soulful.*  
Therefore, the error is in option 3.

**Sol 611.**

The correct form of the given sentence should be: *Yesterday, the Indian government issued a statement urging the public to cooperate in this enquiry.*  
The verb form *urges* does not make sense in this position of the sentence. It requires the -ing form of the word.  
Therefore, the error is in option 2.

**Sol 612.**

The correct answer is option 3.  
Here, the subject of the latter part of the sentence is the pronoun 'she', which is a singular subject. Thus, the verb following the subject must be in accordance with the subject preceding it.  
Therefore, the verb must change its form from 'were' (plural) to 'was' (singular).  
The correct version of the sentence will be: One of her most brilliant novels was written when she was working as a waitress at a local restaurant.

The corrected sentence is: *Had Rekha not discouraged me I might have sung a song or two at your wedding.*

**Sol 614.**

All are correct.  
The sentence is logically and grammatically correct. There is no error in the sentence.

**Sol 615.** The word 'past' when used as a preposition means 'beyond'. The sentence tells us that the daughter used tactics that were intended to cause a delay so that she could stay up beyond her usual bedtime. Therefore, the correct answer is 'past'.

There is no need to use another conjunction with the phrase 'as soon as'. This makes the use of another conjunction redundant. So, the errorless combination is ACD.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.  
Correct sentence - As soon as I saw the bananas I knew the monkey was hiding in the room.

**Sol 620.**

Correct option - 1  
Stories is a plural noun. So, plural adjective pronoun to be used before it. Hence, option 3 is eliminated. Also, according to subject-verb agreement, the plural verb to be used in the sentence. Hence, replace has with have. Hence, option 2 is eliminated. Now, there are certain words which carry preposition after them. So, word added carries preposition to with it in order to show that something is being added. Hence, option 4 is eliminated. Now, the word fastest shows superlative adjective degree which should be followed by a noun. But grown is a verb. Hence, replace grown with growing. It acts as a gerund noun here. 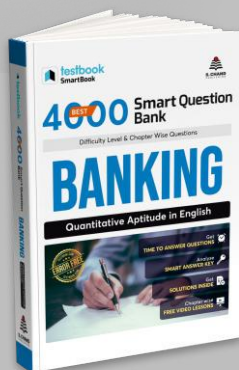
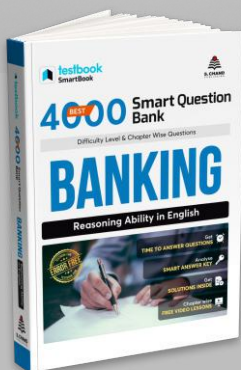

To stride- to walk with long, decisive steps in a specified direction..  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 657.**

The only grammatically correct sentence from the given options is 5.  
The sentence uses the perfect participle form: 'having + past participle of the verb'. It is used in passive voice to show a completed action.  
In order to use the perfect participle form, the present participle 'having' must be used with the past participle of the given verb. Here, 'rose' is the past tense form of the verb 'to rise'. Its past participle is 'risen'. 'Rised' is grammatically incorrect.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 658.**

Correct option - 4  
Let's find out the meanings of the bold words :-  
Confines - To prevent someone or something from leaving or escaping.  
Trample - To deliberately ignore someone's rights or values.

Curtail - To cut short; to cut off.  
Broken up - To break with someone or something.  
With reference to the sentence, it is mentioned that to cut off the existing rights of someone that are not attached with someone. This is not related, since each person has been given rights i.e. Fundamental Rights. Hence, word 'broken up' is not correct. So, replace broken up with attached.  
Correct sentence - The confines of law cannot trample on or curtail the inherent rights attached with an individual.

Out of the given words, only despotik is spelt incorrectly. Given the context, its correct spelling should be despotic.  
Despotic- tyrannical or dictatorial.  
Disgruntled- angry or dissatisfied.  
To avow- To assert, admit, or state something publicly.  
Retribution- Revenge, punishment inflicted on someone as vengeance for a wrong or criminal act.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 661.**

Out of the given words, only werewithal is spelt incorrectly. Given the context, its correct spelling should be wherewithal.  
Wherewithal- the money or other means needed for a particular purpose.  
Sum- a particular amount of money.  
Ransom- a sum of money demanded or paid for the release of a captive.  
Mercenaries- a person primarily motivated by personal gain.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 662.**

Out of the given words, only nihilist is spelt incorrectly. Given the context, its correct spelling should be nihilist.  
Nihilist- a person who believes that life is meaningless and rejects all religious and moral principles.  
Ceaselessly - continuously and without end.  
Consortium- an association, typically of several companies.  
To betray- To be disloyal, to expose something to danger by treacherously giving information to an enemy.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 663.**

**Valour-** great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.

**Ancestor-** a person, typically one more remote than a grandparent, from whom one is descended.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 665.**

All of the given words are contextually correct.

Meanings of the words:

enthralled- to capture the fascinated attention of.

**entrails-** a person's or animal's intestines or internal organs, especially when removed or exposed.

**gloriously-** in a way that is worthy of fame or admiration; impressively.

**sacrificed-** offer or kill as a part of religious ritual.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 666.**

Out of the given words, the only contextually wrong word is irreverent, which means showing a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously.

e.g. She is irreverent about the religious practices in her household.

Since the sentence mentions being 'precise', the correct word here could be irrelevant, which means not connected with or relevant to something.

Meanings of the other words:

**futile-** incapable of producing any useful result; pointless.

To opine- To hold and state something as one's opinion.

**precise-** marked by exactness and accuracy of expression or detail.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 667.**

All of the given words are spelt correctly.

**Consequently-** as a result of something.

**Despondent-** in low spirits from loss of hope or courage.

**Predecessor-** a person who held a job or office before the current holder.

**Gloomy-** dark or poorly lit, especially so as to appear depressing or frightening.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 668.**

All of the given words are correctly spelt.

**Sol 669.**

Out of the given words, only gnowing is spelt incorrectly. Given the context, its correct spelling should be gnawing.

**Dyspeptic-** having indigestion or a consequent air of irritable bad temper.

**Difficile-** abbreviation for Clostridium; difficile: a type of bacteria that can cause serious illness and that is very difficult to treat.

To suffer- experience or be subjected to something bad or unpleasant.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 670.**

The error lies in parts I and III, with the use of "focused" because it does not match with the present tense followed in the remaining parts of the sentence and the omission of the base verb "be" in the last part.

Thus, option 4 is the correct answer.

Correct sentence:

Education today is *focusing* on improving the grades of the students when it should really be about teaching them valuable life lessons and virtues, and hope for them to *be* the best versions of themselves.

**Sol 671.**

The error lies in part III because of preposition "from" which generally expresses the beginning of some duration and this meaning does not fit in with the sentence. Whereas, "for" expresses present point of duration and better fit the meaning in the sentence.

Therefore, error lies in part 3 of the sentence, therefore, option 5 is the correct answer.

Corrected sentence:

Change is a natural process of life yet, some welcome it and some shun it away and both have strong arguments *for* their standpoints.

**Sol 672.**

The error lies in the part I which uses past tense with "was" and that does not fit in grammatically with the meaning of the sentence. The correct tense is *simple present*.

Therefore, error lies in part 1 of the sentence, therefore, option 3 is the correct answer.

Corrected sentence:

Violence *is* all around us spreading and clawing on forward with each new manifestation while non-violence struggles to be heard from the shadows.

**Sol 673.**

The correct answer is option 2, i.e. B.

The error lies in part B.

The correct idiom is 'the ins and outs' meaning 'the full details'.

The correct sentence is:-

The accountant knew the ins and outs of the financial transaction and therefore could spot the irregularity immediately.

**Sol 674.**

The correct answer is 'B' i.e. error lies in part B of the sentence.

 **Key-Points**

- In part B of the sentence, the usage of 'of' is incorrect instead of it use 'at'
- 'Hint at' means 'to talk about in an indirect way about something'
- Let's see an example-
  - The history textbook only hinted at the racial prejudice of that era.

The correct sentence is:- *In his work, Arthashastra, Chanakya often hints at the value of having an efficient espionage system.*

**Sol 675.**

The correct answer is option 2, i.e. B

The error lies in part B.

If the nouns suggest one idea to the mind or refer to the same person or thing, the verb will be singular.

Here, "the rise and fall" refer to one thing, which is, "the Roman empire." Therefore, the verb will be singular and not plural. Thus, the correct verb construction is "has."

The correct sentence is:-

The rise and fall of the Roman empire has been well chronicled by the British historian, Edward Gibbon.

**Sol 676.**

There is no error in the above sentence.. The verbs, tenses and subject-verb agreement that are being used in the sentence, are in accordance with the syntax thereby making sense. Hence, option 5 is the correct answer.

**Sol 677.**

(1) has an error.

'The U.S. dollar could gone'

Simple Present Verb follows the modal helping verb 'could'.

The **correct** verb to be used is 'go'.

**Sol 678.**

The error lies in part 4. The preposition used in the sentence is 'from', which is incorrect. 'To dedicate' is devoted to or specifically intended for a purpose. So, the correct preposition to be used here becomes 'to'.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 679.**

The given sentence has two errors, which lie in parts B and C. Part B uses the preposition 'at', which is incorrect here. Given the context, the correct preposition should be 'as', which completes the conjunction phrase 'insofar as'.  
Part C uses the condensed for IT'S= IT+IS. This is incorrect here, given the context. Since it is referring to the providers 'belonging to' or 'of' the family, the correct form here should be the determiner 'ITS'.

None of the other parts have any grammatical errors. So, the error-free parts are AD.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

Correct sentence:

*The family is assured greater stability of livelihood insofar as its providers are corporation members who command respect due to their social positions.*

**Sol 680.**

The error lies in part 3.

The sentence uses the preposition 'in' after 'walking', in part 3, which cannot make the sentence meaningful.

Given the context, the correct word here should be the conjunction 'if', as the next part is a complete sentence, dependent on the first parts.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

The correct sentence will be: *Their pendant, flabby ears extend to the ground, and would impede their feet in walking if they did not support them on their hands.*

**Sol 681.**

Correct option - 2

When two past actions are described with conjunction before or after, then following pattern is used -

Past perfect tense(1st action) + before + simple past tense (2nd action)

Simple past tense(2nd action) + after + past perfect tense (1st action)

Hence, replace had reached with reached. Thus, option 2 is the correct answer.

Correct sentence:

The train had departed long before / *reached* the station.

**Sol 682.** The error is in sentence A where the word 'with' is incorrect and must be replaced with 'while' to make the sentence correct. The second part of the sentence represents a contrasting fact to what is mentioned in the first part thus 'while' fits here correctly. It means 'meanwhile.' Option 1 is thus the correct answer.

**Sol 683.**

The correct option is option 3, as the word 'suggesting' is incorrectly spelt as 'sugesting'.

'Suggest' means 'to **put forward for consideration**'.

'Moderate' means 'average in amount, intensity, quality, or degree'.

**Sol 684.** The error is in part D of the sentence as the noun 'technology' is incorrect here and should be replaced with the adjective 'technological' to make the sentence correct. The word acts on the noun 'knowledge' thus it should be an adjective.

**Sol 685.** The error lies in part D of the sentence as the structure of the sentence has been incorrect. The word 'any' should be written after the word 'than' to structure the sentence correctly. It should read as: *... than any other country globally.*

**Sol 686.**

The only ways of beginning the sentence is with **options I and II**. 'Being a very inquisitive person by nature she will get to the bottom of this matter.' 'As she is very inquisitive by nature, she will get to the bottom of this matter.'

Option III cannot act as a link.

**Hence the correct answer is option 4.**

**Sol 687.**

The correct answer is option 5.



**Key-Points**

Option 5 contains the errorless sentence.

- Option 1 is incorrect because an adjective is used in place of an adverb. 'severe' must be replaced with 'severely', since a verb (affecting) is to be modified.
- Option 2 is incorrect because 'that' is missing. In Indirect speech, 'that' is used after the reporting verb.
- Option 3 is incorrect because wrong preposition is used in place of adverb. 'off' must be used instead of 'of'.
  - 'off' means 'away from the place in question'. 'off' is perfect in context of the sentence.
- Option 4 is incorrect because subject-verb agreement is ignored here. 'accompany' must replace 'accompanies' because subject is plural ('sambar and chutney').

**Sol 688.**

The sentences should be joined into a single compound sentence using conjunctions and punctuations at proper places while maintaining grammatical congruency and logical connections.

Looking at the options, we can eliminate option 4 straightaway as *although* has been incorrectly used: there is no contrast in the sentences. Also, the last part of the compound sentence is grammatically unsound. Either there should be a conjunction between the words *communities* and *simultaneously* or the word *develop* should be changed to *developing* to correct the last part.

Option 3 is also eliminated as the use of *in spite of* is not required because there is no hint of any contrast. For the same reason, option 2 is incorrect as the conjunction *whereas* is used to bring out the contrast or make a comparison.

Option 1 seems to be sensible. *While* has been appropriately used as it conveys that two separate actions or effects occur at the same time. (*While* can also be used to highlight contrast but here, it does not serve that function).

Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.

**Sol 689.**

The sentences should be read carefully to understand the meaning clearly. The nerve messenger Serotonin present in Kiwis has a relaxing effect and can help one fall asleep faster. Serotonin also helps in curbing carb craving.

Option 3 is incorrect as *kiwis* should be followed by *have not has* as the word is plural.

Option 1 can be eliminated because the conjunction *because* is used to provide explanations or reasons. It has been incorrectly used as the part of the sentence following *because* describes the functions of Serotonin.

Option 4 seems to be appropriate. The conjunction *while* used here indicates that two effects or actions happen at the same time.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 690.**

The sentences should be read carefully in order to grasp the meaning being conveyed. Then a compound sentence should be formed using conjunctions and punctuations such that the meaning remains intact.

Options 1 and 4 are not correct as these have misplaced the word *normally*. 'Senior promotions are normally announced' is not the fact being conveyed. 'Such announcement normally includes the list of prominent executives reporting to the individual' is what the sentences convey. This subtle difference is enough to eliminate the options.

Option 3 is incorrect because the use of *hence* is done to say 'for this reason'. But, the part of the sentence after *hence* contrasts the remaining part and is not the consequence of something.

Option 2 seems logically sound. The conjunction *however* highlights the contrast appropriately. Also, the use of *commas* is grammatically correct.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

**Sol 691.**

On a careful reading of the sentences, we get a fair idea of the content being conveyed. The single compound sentence so

formed should be grammatically correct, conveying a similar meaning.

Let us check the options one by one.

Option 1 : This is incorrect because of the disruptive flow of the sentences. The use of *because* of twice in the sentence is unnecessary. Instead, the sentence could have been improved by using the phrase 'because of the fact that with only around 44 branches, their standalone net profits are of Rs 34 billion in FY'2018'.

Option 2 : The use of *although* is done to convey a surprising or contrasting element. It has been misplaced in the sentence. Citibank India's operations are significant as their standalone net profits are of Rs. 34 billion in FY'2018. The surprise lies in the fact that they have only 44 branches. So, we can eliminate this option.

Option 3 : This makes logical sense. The use of *even though* is done appropriately to highlight the fact that with only 44 branches, Citibank India managed to have standalone net profits of Rs 34 billion in FY'18.

Option 4 : The use of *nonetheless* is not required as we have already used *even though* in the first part of the sentence. Either 'Even though it has only around 44 branches, Citibank India's operations in India are significant as they made standalone net profits of Rs 34 billion in FY'2018' or 'With only around 44 branches, Citibank India's operations in India are nonetheless significant as they made standalone net profits of Rs 34 billion in FY'2018' would have been a meaningful sentence.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

#### Sol 692.

A semicolon (;) is used as a punctuation mark to connect independent clauses – clauses which can stand alone and are complete. These are used as a stronger division in a sentence that already contains commas. Keeping this point in view, we can eliminate option 4 – the sentence 'officially making 2018 the weakest year for home sales since 2015 and citing the data from the National Association of Realtors' cannot stand on its own. A comma (,) could have been used instead of a semicolon.

Option 1 is incorrect as the last part of the sentence is abrupt in nature which disturbs the smooth consistency of the sentence. Compound sentences are complex in nature because of the fact that such sentences are carefully formed using punctuations and conjunctions in the right places in order to make the thought flow smooth. If this is absent, we can eliminate the option.

Option 3 is incorrect because the use of *since* distorts the meaning. Citing data from the National Association of Realtors is a reason for nothing discussed in the sentence – it is just an additional fact.

Option 2 seems to be correct logically and grammatically. The fluidity is maintained in the sentence without compromising on the context.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

#### Sol 693.

Let's look at the sentences part by part and determine the answer by process of elimination.

'Prevalent' means widespread or powerful. Given this meaning, the only meaningful form here becomes 'how prevalent', as it talks about the extent of the power.

So, only options 1 and 5 are viable answers.

Out of these,

the sentence talks about 'depending on something', which suggests a possibility. This is only reflected by the 'may prefer'.

The simple present tense form 'prefer' is not as meaningful as the former. Option 5 is grammatically correct but option 1 is grammatically and contextually correct.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 1.

#### Sol 694.

The only way of beginning the sentence is with **option I**. '*Wanting to impress her family with her culinary skills she made a pie which unfortunately turned out to be a disaster.*'

- The II starts with 'unfortunately'. '**Unfortunately**' is a connector used when a statement is already mentioned before and for contradicting the independent clause. Hence, it cannot begin the sentence.
- The III seems a dependent clause.

- The I, according to the rule of Inversion, can be a start to the sentence.
- Options II and III cannot act as a link.

Hence **the correct answer is option 1**.

- **Extra bites:** '*Inversion*' is putting the verb before the subject. According to the rule, the adverbial clause starts the sentence.

#### Sol 695.

Here, the sentences indicate that the person was not affected by three days of arguments swirling around him. Hence, he did not offer an opinion. In such a case, the conjunction *despite* is appropriate to link the sentences. *Despite* means without being influenced and taking notice of something. It is similar to *in spite of*.

So, we can use phrase (i) in the following manner:

*Despite three days of arguments swirling around him on topics from politics to corporal punishment, he never offered an opinion.*

However, we cannot use phrase (ii) and (iii) in any manner to link the sentences.

Note – *Though* highlights contrast. It can be used to link the sentences in the following manner:

*Though three days of arguments swirled around him on topics from politics to corporal punishment, he never offered an opinion.*

But, we should understand that *though* should come before *three days of arguments* and not before *he never offered*. So, we cannot use phrase (iii).

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

#### Sol 696.

The correct answer is BD.

### Key-Points

- 'Tremendous' is an adjective and 'enthusiastically' is an adverb. Ideally, we should write an adverb before an adjective. Because it 'modifies the meaning of an adjective, verb, or other adverbs, expressing manner, place, time, or degree.'
- So 'tremendously enthusiastic' is correct.
- Also 'all the' indicates a plural number. So we can't use 'child' in part D of the sentence. It should be 'children'.
- Thus, the error lies in part B and D, making option 4, the correct answer.

#### Sol 697.

The given sentence has one error, which lies in part C.

Part C uses the past tense form of the verb, viz, 'spoke'. This is incorrect, given the context.

Since the tense used before the verb is simple future tense 'will', the correct form of the verb used here becomes the simple present tense of the verb, viz, 'speak'.

So, the errorless combination is ABD.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

Correct sentence:

If pressured by the committee, won't he *speak* the truth about the cheating team?

#### Sol 698.

The given sentence has one error, which lies in part B.

Part B uses the form 'had been tilled', which is passive, and hence is incorrect here.

The correct form here should be 'had been tilling', which makes the sentence meaningful.

So, the errorless combination is ACD.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 2.

Correct sentence:

The peasants *had been tilling* the land since the independence era.

#### Sol 699.

There is no error in the given sentence because all the verbs are in agreement with the tense and the singular-plural forms are well maintained.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 5.

**Sol 700.** The error is in Part II of the sentence. It is an error of subject-verb-agreement. 'Problems' is plural, so the verb must be 'were' instead of 'was'. **So option 2 is the correct option which requires correction.**

**Sol 701.**

The error lies in parts 2 and 3.  
Part 2 uses the pronoun 'which', which is incorrect here. Since the pronoun refers to 'persons', it must be the pronoun 'who'.  
Part 3 uses the preposition 'to', which is incorrect. Since the sentence talks about income getting locked up 'in' the form of pending TDS refunds, the correct preposition here should be 'in'.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 702.**

Option 1 uses the noun 'appointment' after the auxiliary verb 'had'. This is incorrect. It should be the verb form 'Had appointed'.  
Correct sentence: The secretary had appointed the same person for the post.

Option 2 incorrectly uses the adverb/conjunction 'as'. Removal of the word makes the sentence meaningful.  
Correct sentence: Even though he knew they were safe, he couldn't stop fighting.

Option 4 uses the incorrect form 'would have been approve'.  
Correct sentence: The council would have approved the decision.  
Option 5 uses the incorrect form 'may currently been creating'.  
Correct sentence: The domain owner is currently creating quite a spectacle.

Option 3 is the only grammatically correct sentence.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 703.**

Option 1 uses the noun 'balance', which is incorrect. As it is used before the noun 'environment', it should be the adjective form 'balanced'.

Option 2 incorrectly uses the pronoun 'theirs' (meaning belonging to them). The correct word here should be the determiner 'them' (meaning a group of people).

Option 3 is incorrect as it does not use any conjunction between the two sentences 'would it have been different' and 'he hadn't come back home'. There should be a conjunction like 'if'.

Option 5 'To being heard' is incorrect form. It should be 'to be heard'.

Option 4 is the only grammatically correct sentence.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 704.**

The error lies in parts I, II, III.

In the given sentence, Part I uses the 'ing' verb as the main verb and without any 'be' verb [like is, was]; which is grammatically incorrect. Instead of being in continuous tense, the main verb here should be either in simple present form 'advises' or simple past 'advised'.

In the given sentence, Part II starts with 'to brushing' which is wrong. The verb 'advise' as followed by noun phrase 'his patients' must take the 'to -infinitive', i.e. to brush.

In the given sentence, Part III is grammatically incorrect as it contains 'before go'. Either 'before you go' or 'before going' should be used here.

Therefore, the correct option is 5. I, II, and III.

Correct sentence: The dentist advised his patients to brush teeth twice a day, once in the morning and another before going to bed at night.

**Sol 705.**

Parts I, II, and III all have errors.

In part I, the phrase 'have predictions that' is incorrect. The correct phrase will be 'have made predictions', or 'have predicted that', as given in the alternative.

In part II, the phrase 'bound to', which means 'tied to', is incorrect. The correct phrase will be 'bound for', which means 'headed for'.

In part III, the preposition 'along' is incorrect. The correct preposition will be 'across', as given in the alternative'. 'Across multiple sectors' means 'affecting multiple sectors'.

Thus, the correct answer will be Option 5, that is, 'I, II and III'.

**Sol 706.**

The sentences suggest that there is a time-relativity between the sentences, i.e., the second happens after the first.

In such cases, conjunctions like 'after' or 'since', as shown by I. So, a contextually coherent joined sentence is given by Only I. None of the other phrase/s can make the sentence meaningful.  
Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 707.**

The correct answer is option 1.  
The words 'as', 'since' and 'because' carry the same meaning, i.e., 'for the reason that'. All three can be used to begin the sentence correctly, without changing the meaning of the initial sentences.  
The correct sentences would be:

i. As we were running late, we didn't read the final chapter, yet we still enjoyed the book.

ii. Since we were running late, we didn't read the final chapter, yet we still enjoyed the book.

iii. Because we were running late, we didn't read the final chapter, yet we still enjoyed the book.

Thus, the correct answer is option 1, i.e., i, ii and iii.

**Sol 708.**

- But since, there is a saying "like a rudderless ship/boat" which means "if an organisation, company, government, etc, is like a rudderless ship, it has no clear direction and drifts about without reaching its goals."
- The correct word should be 'rudderless.'
- Thus **option 1** is the correct answer.

The two sentences give information about IAS officer named K Jayaganesh. The conjunction *wherein* means in which. It is mostly used in formal writing. Here, the word does not suit the context and hence, we can eliminate phrase (II).  
We can use phrases (I) and (III) in the following manner:  
*Hailing from a poverty-stricken family in Vinavamangalam of Tamil Nadu's Vellore district, IAS officer K Jayaganesh cracked the Civil Services exam in 2008 in his seventh attempt*  
*IAS officer K Jayaganesh, who cracked the Civil Services exam in 2008 in his seventh attempt, hailed from a poverty-stricken family in Vinavamangalam of Tamil Nadu's Vellore district.*  
Thus, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 713.**

The error lies in part 3 of the sentence as the adjective 'fast' in positive form is incorrect after the word 'much' and must be replaced with the adjective 'faster' in the comparative form to make the sentence correct.  
It should read as '*Average global sea level has increased eight inches since 1880, but is rising much faster on the U.S. East Coast and the Gulf of Mexico.*'  
For eg: She walks much faster than her brother.  
Option 3 is the correct answer.  
The word 'much' is a quantifier and determines the extent of quickness in the rise of temperature.

**Sol 714.**

The correct answer is option 2.

 **Key-Points**

- There is an error in the subject-verb agreement of the sentence.
- The subject of the sentence is 'Anita's ability to code and hack' is singular and thus the verb too should singular.

The sentence is of present tense as can be seen from the use of the verb "believes". The verbs that follow should also be of the present tense form. However, the sentence contains an incorrect helping verb in part (4). The verb "will have" is of future perfect tense and is therefore incorrect. Therefore, the correct sentence: *My grandmother believes in the saying, "From dust you are born and to dust you will return."* Hence, the correct option is 4.

### Sol 729.

The error lies in parts 1 and 2. Part 1 uses the preposition 'from' before *'the presidential'* which is incorrect. The correct preposition is 'of'. Part 2 uses the simple past tense form 'spent', which is incorrect here. Since the sentence begins with the phrase *'At this stage...'* we understand that the activity is ongoing, that is why the tense used will be present tense. Therefore, 'spend' which is the simple present form of the verb will be used. Part 3 is grammatically correct and hence does not require any corrections. Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

### Sol 730.

The underlined part of the sentence is grammatically incorrect. The structure of the sentence is in simple present, hence the verb in the underlined part of the sentence should also be in the present tense. The adverb 'erroneously' meaning 'in a mistaken way; incorrectly' should be used instead of the adjective 'erroneous'. Hence the correct answer is option 1.

### Sol 731.

The correct answer is option 5.

Only ii is capable of joining the two sentences but that too with the help of a conjunction, i.e., 'unless', in between the two sentences, which is not allowed. ### Sol 734.

### Sol 738.

The error is in part D as preposition 'with' is incorrect. Preposition 'by' should be used instead of 'with' because 'by' indicates or identify the agent performing the action whereas 'with' indicates the agent used to perform the action.

Therefore, the correct sentence is: Before you fall for big brands and even bigger discounts, take time to consider products that are made by a real person.

Usage of 'with' and 'by' for better understanding are as follows:

1. Students of DAV School made candles *by* themselves for Christmas.

A preposition isn't a preposition unless it goes with a related noun or pronoun, called the object of the preposition.

Examples:

- *Let's meet before noon.*
- *Before is a preposition; noon is its object.*
- *We've never met before.*

There is no object; before is an adverb modifying met.

Hence the correct answer is option 2.

The error lies in part 3.

The sentence uses the adjective form 'absolute', which is incorrect. Since it refers to the verb 'to count on', it should be in its adverb form 'absolutely'.

It should be 'blessed' instead of 'blessing'.

The word blessing is grammatically incorrect in this context and blessed makes more sense.

Blessed means that the fortune has been handed down by a deity of some sort.

Whereas blessing means is a favour or gift bestowed by God. Therefore blessed makes more sense in this context.

**Sol 755.** There is one error in the sentence. The third part of the sentence uses the past perfect continuous tense verb 'been acted', which is incorrect. The rule when using the perfect continuous tense is to use 'been' + verb + '-ing' suffix. Therefore, the correct answer is option 3.

**Sol 756.**

The correct answer is Option 1, i.e., part A.

- The sentence uses the incorrect adverb 'thus'.

The correct preposition here must be 'for' twenty years, as it refers to something that has been going on 'for' a duration; and not 'in' or 'about'.

Therefore, the correct answer is option 4.

**Sol 829.**  
The correct answer is option 3  
The sentence uses the phrase 'the number of', which suggests that the corresponding auxiliary verb must also be singular. Because we are referring to the 'number' of elephants and not the 'elephants' themselves, we cannot use the plural form 'have'. So, the error lies in part 3. Thus, the word 'have' should be replaced with 'has'.

**Sol 830.**  
When a sentence is of the form:-  
Subject + be-verb + main verb + pronoun + transitive verb + direct object

The verbs will be affected by the subject and then the pronoun and in turn the verbs will influence each other.  
Since, the be-verb used is of past tense, the transitive verb used should also be of a past form.

Thus, option 1 is eliminated since the transitive verb used is of present perfect continuous tense form. Option 5 is eliminated because the modal verb "could" is never used alongside an -ing form of verb. Option 3 is eliminated because the transitive verb is of present form while the be-verb is of past form.

Option 4 is eliminated because the word "unsures" is grammatically incorrect.

Therefore, option 2 is the correct answer.

**Sol 831.**

When an interrogative question is made along with the use of a question tag there is a rule which should be followed.

A positive sentence should always be followed by a negative question tag and so sentence 2 and 3 are eliminated.

The **verb** in the sentence will then affect the verb or tense of the question tag. Since, the sentence is **present tense**, we eliminate sentence 4 and 5 because they are both in the **past tense**.

Hence, the correct sentence is sentence 1 and correct option is option 1.

**Sol 832.**

The sentence is an interrogative sentence and is of the form:

Have + subject + past participle form of the verb

The sentence is in present perfect tense and the verbs used in the sentence should be past participle form and the to-be verbs should be present in their form too. Therefore, the sentences 3,4 and 5 are eliminated due to use of incorrect to-be verbs or auxiliary verbs.

The sentence 2 is eliminated because the sentence begins with incorrect root verb which is had. Since the subject is you, the root verb to be used is have.

Hence, the correct sentence is sentence 1 and the correct option is option 1.

**Sol 833.**

The sentence is of the form:

Subject + verb + object

Since, the sentence is in past perfect tense, the verbs should also be of past form. The **verbs** to be used are "**pay**" and "**visit**" and therefore, the sentences 1, 2 and 4 are eliminated. The sentence 3 is eliminated because the adjective "sicky" used here is incorrect. Hence, the correct option is option 5.

**Sol 834.**

The sentence is of the form:

Subject + verb + pronoun + verb2 + object

The sentence is in **simple past tense** and the **verbs** should be the base form of the verb i.e contact. Therefore, the sentences 2,3 and 5 are eliminated since they use incorrect forms of verbs.

The sentence 4 is eliminated because the father's quality is referred to using a verb i.e estrange which refers to the process of becoming detached from one another and not an adjective i.e estranged which means no longer living together.

Hence, the correct sentence is sentence 1 and the correct option is option 1.



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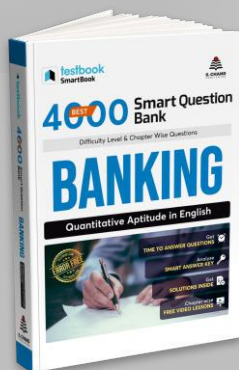
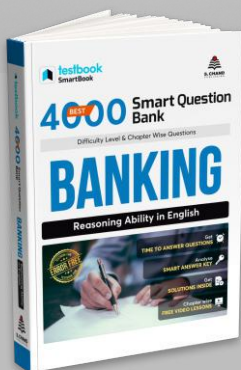
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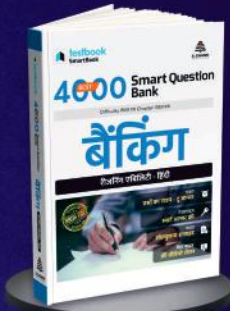
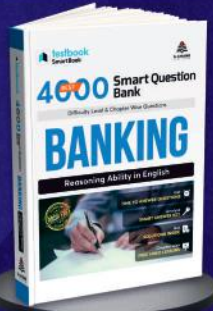
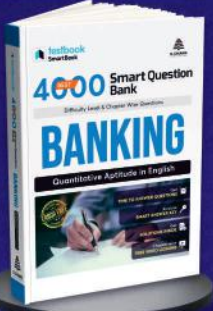
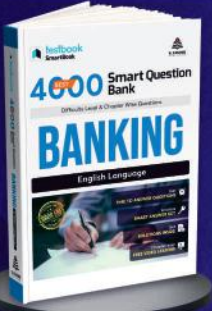
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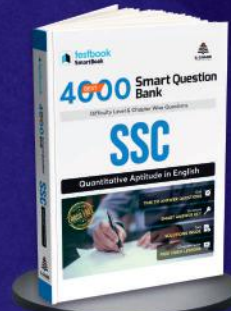
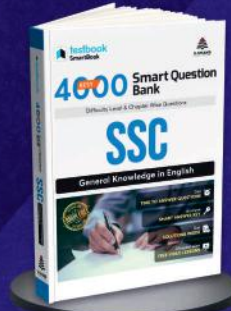
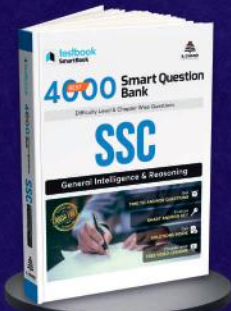
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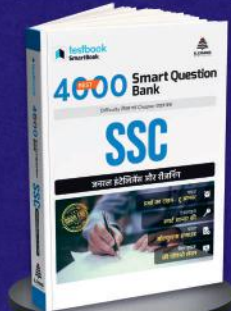
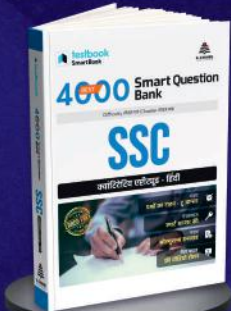
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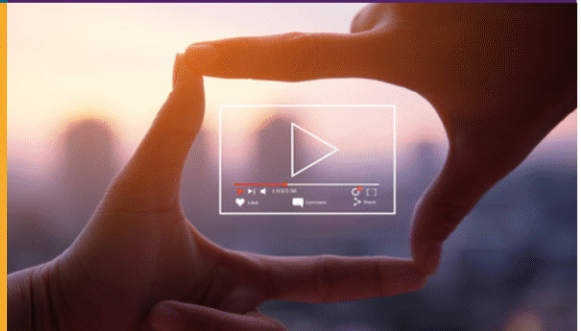
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
